The large proportion of strangers in the crowd at the beach was very obvious. The visitors greatly outnumbered the Highland Park people. Members of clubs and family groups are increasingly making use of the local bathing beach each Sunday.

This weekly immigration of strangers has raised a problem here. Many people resent having the local beach growded with visiting Mrs. Cole's parents, Mr. and city people every Sunday. They believe Highland Park people should not be inconvenienced by city people who come here Sun-

Possibly to keep the visitors away would be a happier arrangement for Highland Park. But how can this be done?

To better illustrate the question, let us consider a similar situation. Suppose a Highland Park citizen wishes to spend the day in Lincoln Park, Chicago. He goes to the park when he fornia have arrived to spend several pleases, and feels just as much at home as any Chicagoan. If he weeks with their sister, Mrs. A. L. wants to go in bathing he goes. No one asks him where he is Renning. from, and no discrimination is shown against him. If any such discrimination were shown he would be justly indignant.

Strangers who come to Highland Park expect to receive the same treatment. As long as they submit to regulations that are imposed by the city they expect to enjoy themselves unmolested.

Thus it will be seen that the problem is a difficult one. There can be no direct line of discrimination. The matter must be taken care of in an indirect manner if it is to be solved at all. The city authorities have managed the beach efficiently and well. The locker system inaugurated by the city is so arranged that the visitors from other cities pay the greater part of the beach expenses. It has been pointed out that without this revenue from strangers the beach would not be self-supporting. The many conveniences at the lake are paid for out of ticket receipts.

Those who criticize the methods of the authorities in charge of the beach should realize that the problem is a difficult one. There should be no criticism of existing conditions which is not accompanied by a suggestion for bettering them.
