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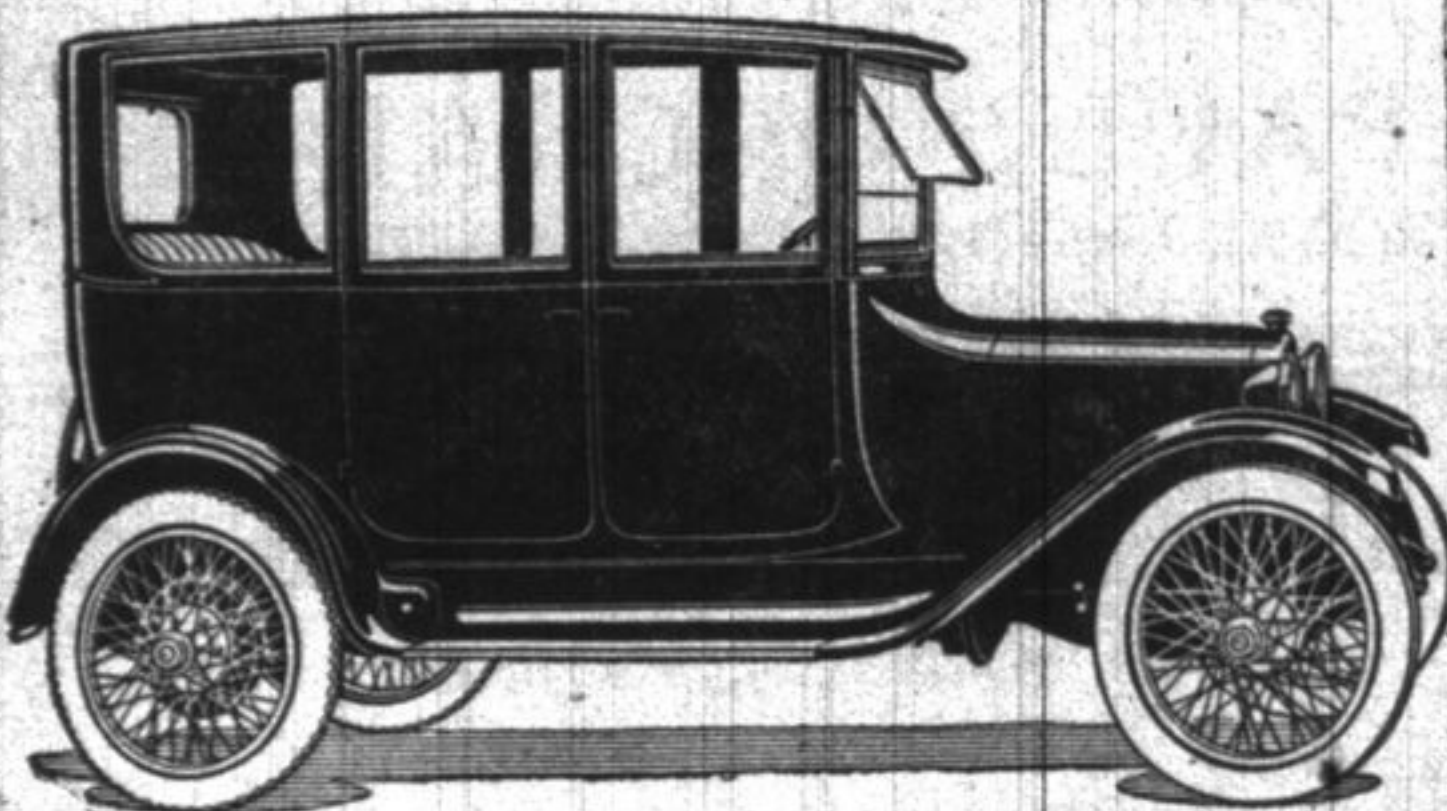
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The boys who are looking for summer jobs do not object to working in the offices where the girls are employed.

SAILOR DROWNED AT ARDEN SHORE

Shipmate Escapes Similar Fate After Hard Struggle in Lake Michigan

B. E. Caldwell, a hospital apprentice, first class, attached to the main hospital corps at Great Lakes, was drowned off Arden Shore about 7:00 o'clock last Wednesday evening when, with three other sailors he was in bathing in Lake Michigan.

It came nearly being a double drowning because a ship mate named Lambritt, who went to rescue Caldwell almost lost his life in the attempt, as Caldwell seized him about the neck and in his desperation to save himself almost pulled his would-be rescuer below the water.

A sudden attack of cramps caused this tragedy which is one of the first of the season at Great Lakes.

With three shipmates Caldwell went swimming down at Arden Shore, not far south of Great Lakes. He is a fairly good swimmer and had gone out in the water not very far beyond his depth when he was seized with cramps and began yelling for help. His three friends rushed to his aid and Lambritt was the first to arrive.

Then began a battle in which Lambritt finally had to relax and let go of Caldwell and he sank below the surface. The sailors all then made it a point to try to recover his body immediately and they did so shortly afterward but too late to resuscitate him.

Caldwell was about 18 years of age and his next of kin is his father, W. E. Caldwell of Flourens, South Carolina. He had been at the station about five months and was a graduate of Portsmouth, N. H. Pharmacist school. He was transferred to Great Lakes December 19, 1920.

His remains were shipped back to his father.

305 MARRIAGES DURING LAST MONTH

June is Still "Bride's" Month; Comparison With Former Years

In spite of pessimistic predictions early in the month, June brides of this year did not fall far behind those of the high record years, according to records on file in the office of County Clerk Lew A. Hendee. The total number of June weddings in Lake County this year was 305.

DAUGHTER ASPIRES TO SUCCEED W. E. MASON

Mrs. Winifred Mason Huck Wants to Fill Her Father's Place in Congress

Mrs. Winifred Mason Huck, youngest daughter of the late Congressman William E. Mason, has announced her desire to succeed him as "congresswoman-at-large" from Illinois.

Mrs. Huck has dedicated the balance of her years to "carrying on the unfinished work" of her father. Although the mother of four children, she says her "intensive domestic duties" are done, and should not interfere with her desire to enter public life.

Mrs. Huck has conferred with Mayor Thompson and is now in Springfield to see Governor Len Small in regard to the possibility of her appointment to succeed her father ad interim until the prescribed election can be held. She says this constitutional authority rests with the governor, although Assistant Corporation Counsel James Breen disagrees with her on this point.

If a special election is necessary she will be a candidate.
