CITIZEN OBJECTS TO OPEN CUT-OUT

S. F. Newhall Writes Open Letter to Press Calling Attention to Needless Noise

Every city or large town, in these times must, in the nature of things, be subject to unavoidable noises, but the unearthly racket of this otherwise model town of Highland Park is to a large extent avoidable. For years the effort of the automobile manufacturer was to produce a machine as nearly noiseless as possible and today every car of standard make, if carefully run, is practically noiseless. Every city has ordinances against the avoidable noise caused by "cutting out the muffler," but when was an arrest ever made here for violation of this ordinance or that other ordinance against the excessive and unnecessary stretch from the exhaust pipe.

Every hour in the day home-owned machines are so operated on our residence streets that their drivers are subject to arrest and fine. A single arrest for violation of either of these ordinances would stop them.

Then why must the public continue to put up with this diabolical stretch—this nasty, noxious, NEEDLESS noise?

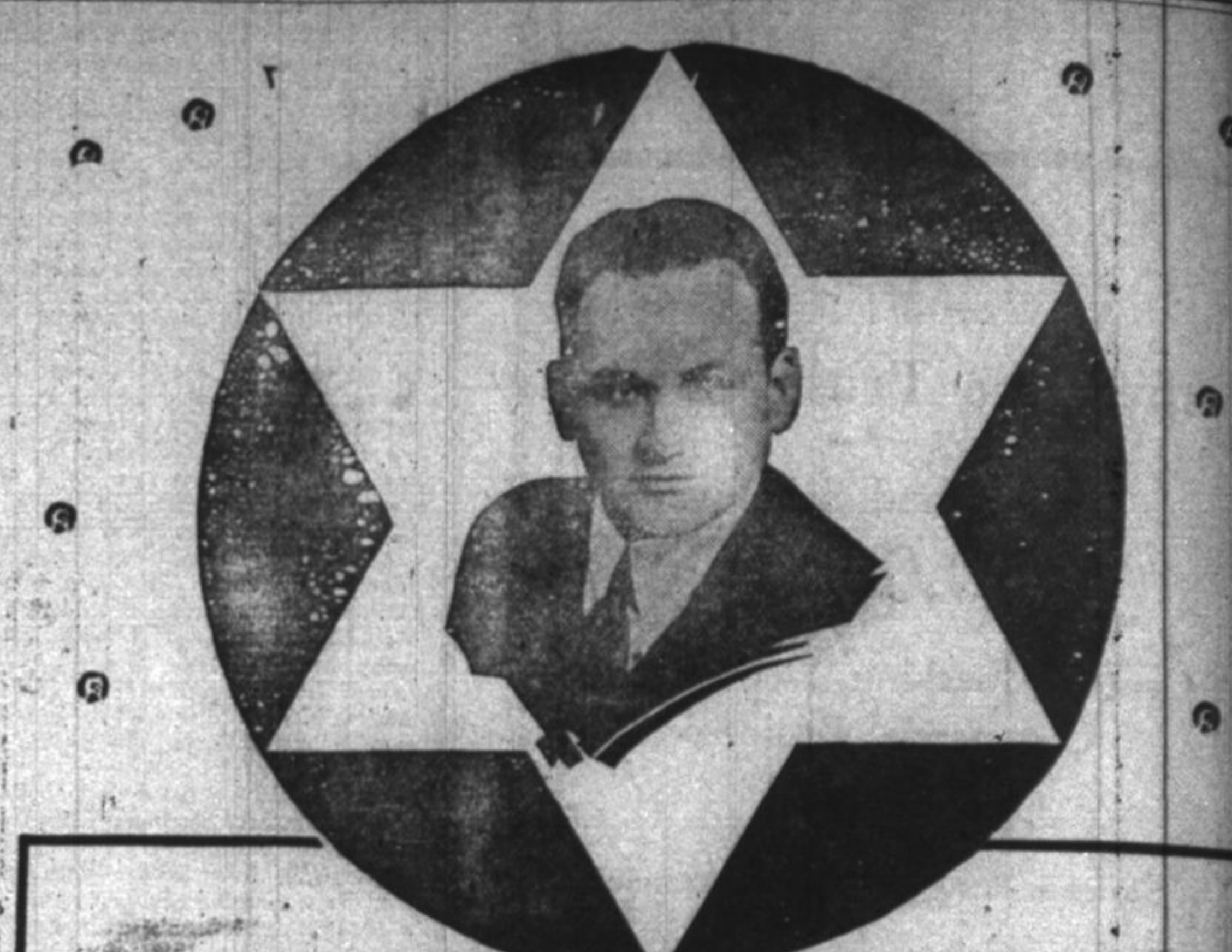
