**THREE DROWNED AT WAUKEGAN LAST WEEK**

**MORE LAKE FATALITIES**

**Youth Goes Down at Foss Park While Swimming; Other Interesting Items of Lake County News**

There were three drownings at Waukegan last week, the first of the season there. Tuesday night Peter Olsen, 16, a high school student, was drowned while swimming alone. John Salo, 28, was another victim. He was drowned in the Morrow pond on the north flats Friday afternoon. Salo could not swim. Thursday afternoon John Miller, 15, was drowned at Foss Park. He had been attending the picnic of the National Envelope company, and had won a prize in a bicycle race. Exhaustion following the race is believed to have weakened the boy.

Repairing the damage done to the county court house by an electrical storm some time ago will cost several hundred dollars. A 20 foot pole topped by a weather vane, on the court house tower was snapped off by a bolt of lightning.

The body of Lieut. Homer Dahringer, first Lake county aviator to lose his life in the late war, and for whom the Homer Dahringer post of the American Legion at Waukegan was named, has been returned to that city for burial. The funeral services were conducted by the American Legion, and full military honors were accorded.

Mrs. Jerusha Hill Ford, 94, Wauconda, one of the county's oldest residents, died in that village.

Fred Liefer's general store building at Rosencrans was destroyed by fire last week when an oil stove set fire to it. The building had been used as an election hall.

Policeman Thomas McMahon of the Waukegan police department had a desperate revolver battle with an automobile party last week. McMahon on his motorcycle, was following a Cadillac sedan, and both were going at a 60-mile clip. Three shots, fired from the Cadillac struck his machine. The officer gave up the chase after exhausting his ammunition. The race started on Washington street, near the Edison court station of the North Shore electric line, and ended on Green Bay road south of the city.

Despite the intervention of Mrs. Jane Dowie, who came to Zion from California, to check the affair, the monster symbolic picture of her husband, the late Alexander Dowie, founder of Zion, was photographed in Zion Thursday afternoon, July 14. Two thousand five hundred members of the Voliva faction, including the white-robed choir of four hundred and fifty, and the Zion band of fifty pieces, participated in the picture.

Five Fox Lake and Pistakee Bay individuals were arrested in a raid by agents from the state's attorney's office last week end. Several others, who had been arrested previously, were fined by Judge Persons in county court last Saturday. They drew fines ranging from \$100 to \$750. Joseph Hoffman of Fox Lake was fined \$750 and sentenced to serve ninety days in the county jail. An appeal was taken.

Saturday, July 30, bicycle races will be held at Libertyville on the half mile track. There will be a five mile race for boys, a ten mile race for men, open to Lake county riders only, and a ten mile race, free for all. An effort is being made to interest all riders in Lake county.

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
