

Officials, Attention

The following law (House Bill No. 461) in force July 1, 1919, has not been complied with in Highland Park. WHY? A law is a law and should be obeyed. There is a severe penalty for not doing so.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly: That each public officer, other than a State officer, who, by virtue of his office received or disburses public funds in the discharge of governmental or municipal debts and liabilities, shall, at the expiration of each fiscal year, prepare a statement:

(1) Of all moneys received and from what sources received, giving items, particulars and details;

(2) Of all moneys paid out, giving the name of each individual to whom paid, on what account paid, and the amount.

Such statement shall be subscribed and sworn to by the public officer making such statement, and, within thirty days after the expiration of such fiscal year shall be filed in the office of the county clerk of the county in which such public officer resides.

Section 2. Such public officer shall also, within thirty days after the expiration of such fiscal year, cause a true, complete and correct copy of such statement to be published one time in a newspaper published in the town, district or municipality in which such public officer hold his office, or, if no newspaper is printed and published in such town, district or municipality, then in a newspaper printed in the English language published in the county in which such public officer resides.

Section 3. The publisher of the newspaper in which a copy of such statement is published shall, within ten days after the publication of such statement, file in the office of the county clerk a certificate of such publication with a printed copy of such statement attached, stating the number of times which the same shall have been published, and the dates of the first and last papers containing the same.

Section 4. The cost of such publication shall be paid by the public officer causing such publication to be made and shall be paid out of the funds in his hands.

Section 5. Any public officer, or any publisher, subject to the provisions of this Act, failing, neglecting or refusing to discharge any duty imposed upon him by this Act shall, for each offense, forfeit the sum of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than five hundred dollars to be recovered in an action of debt in the name of the people of the State of Illinois for the use of any person who may sue for the same.

Section 6. In addition to the penalties provided for in the foregoing section, any public officer, or any publisher, subject to the provisions of this Act, failing, neglecting or refusing to discharge any duty imposed upon him by this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in the sum of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than five hundred dollars or imprisoned in the county jail not longer than one year, or be punished by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

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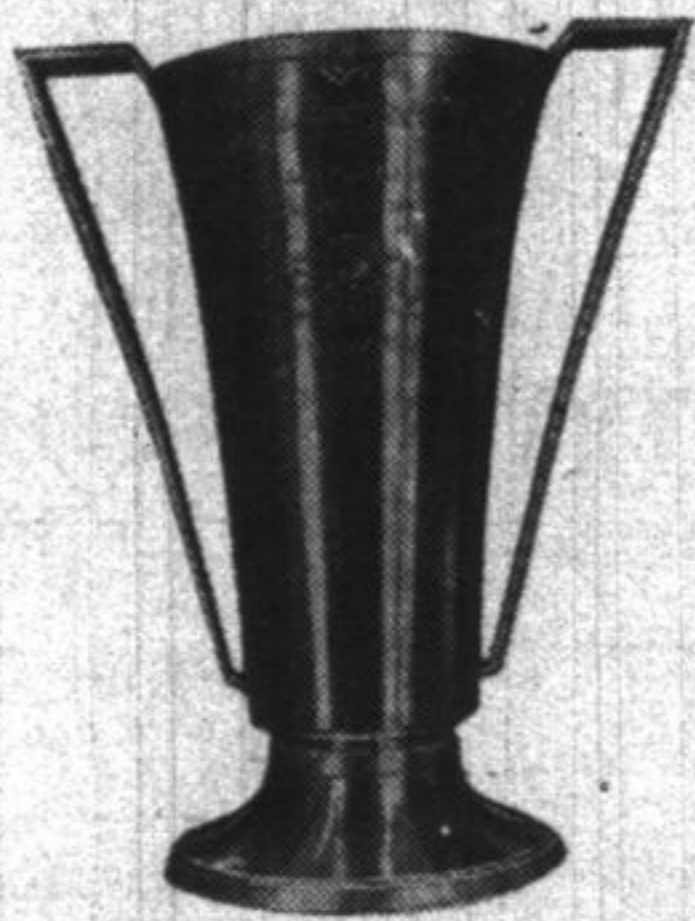
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CENTRAL LIFE LOVING CUP won by

GOVERNOR FAVORS LAKE COUNTY ROADS

Discusses Plans With Delegation From This County; Routes Located Soon

Governor Len Small is taking a keen interest in the early completion of the various road improvement projects in Lake county and expressed himself as realizing the urgent needs of the county because of its proximity to Chicago, whose traffic through here is heavy.

He commented upon these facts at length last week at Springfield, where he met in conference with a delegation of Lake county men, including Charles E. Russell, county superintendent of Highways, Ray Paddock, chairman of the board of supervisors, George Baird and William Stratton.

Gov. Small discussed the road plans for the location of the Libertyville-Antioch state bond issue road, and declared that he will see that this route is located, as until this is done the county officials will be unable to determine several other routes which are to be established and improved. The Libertyville-Antioch road will be materially shortened by making several cut-offs. Among the road improvements that are being held up pending the location of this road is the Lake Villa-Antioch road.

"I am anxious to see Lake county go ahead with its road work," Gov. Small declared, "and will co-operate in every way I can to see that the improvements are made as soon as possible."

If the state locates the Libertyville-Antioch road so that the Lake Villa-Antioch road can be made a part of the project the county will construct an overhead crossing about one mile north of Lake Villa over the Soo line.

The hearing on the location of the Libertyville-Antioch road has been set for July 29.
