LAKE MICHIGAN CLAIMS TWO MORE VICTIMS

BOY SEVEN IS DROWNED

**Bennie Weinstein Drowned off
Rosenwald Estate. W. Schuppert
Killed Diving at
Fort Sheridan**

Bennie Weinstein, seven years old, of 918 Marshfield avenue, Chicago, was drowned Sunday afternoon, while swimming off the Julius Rosenwald estate at Ravinia.

Drowned at Ft. Sheridan
Walter Schuppert whose home is in Milwaukee, Wis., and who is an employe of the Chicago & Northwestern railroad in Chicago, was drowned in the lake at Fort Sheridan at noon Sunday. He was diving off a raft when he struck some object in the water, rendering him unconscious, and he drowned before his companions knew what had happened. The body was in the water only about five minutes. There was a large contusion on Schuppert's head.

Schuppert was one of a party of sixty employes of the railroad who had come to Fort Sheridan to spend the day. The drowning occurred just after the picnic dinner had been served, he being one of the first to enter the water. An inquest was held Monday morning, a jury bringing in a verdict of accidental death.

It had been a custom of Schuppert's to spend Sundays in Milwaukee with his mother and sister, but this week end he decided to go on this picnic and had written to his mother informing her of his plan.

He leaves his mother, three sisters and one brother to survive him.

The body was shipped to Milwaukee where funeral services were held.

OFFER SUGGESTIONS TO REDUCE EGG SPOILAGE

Thousands of dozens of eggs go to waste yearly because of improper handling, according to the Illinois Department of Agriculture, division of foods and dairies. This is a great and unnecessary loss in foodstuffs to the public, and in labor, money, and transportation costs and space to the producer and dealer.

"Besides being so breakable, eggs spoil almost as quickly as meat, yet this waste can be greatly reduced by observing a few simple precautions," says a recent bulletin of the Division, and offers the following reminders:

To Producers—

1. Produce infertile eggs, by removing the roosters from the flocks during the summer.
2. Gather your eggs at least twice a day.
3. Don't wash them. Washed eggs spoil very quickly.
4. Keep them in a cool place, away from odors. Heat very quickly starts incubation, rendering them legally unfit for food. They will absorb odors as readily as butter does.
5. Market frequently, protecting them from the sun and heat in the way.
6. Don't offer bad eggs for sale. It is against the law for a dealer to buy them.

To Shippers and Dealers—

1. You must have a license to buy eggs for resale.
2. You must candle every egg before buying. Reject the bad ones and keep a record of them.
3. Keep eggs cool and away from odors.
4. Ship often. Use sound, clean, fresh fillers and flats.
5. Do not ship heated eggs, which would be good if used at once, but might not stand shipment. Save them by disposing of them locally.

GOVERNOR MAY NAME MRS. HUCK

WOULD SUCCEED FATHER

Daughter of Late Congressman
William E. Mason Seeks
Appointment to
Congress

Gov. Small will appoint Mrs. Winifred Mason Huck, daughter of late Congressman William E. Mason, formerly of Waukegan, to succeed her father in Washington if a vacancy appointment is constitutional.

Assurance by the governor that he is favorable to her candidacy has been sent to Mrs. Huck, following a visit to the Small home in Kankakee. In case she is successful in her plans, she will not only be the first woman to represent the state either

in Springfield or Washington, but she will be the first mother in Congress.

Three Sons, One Daughter

Mrs. Huck, whose husband, Robert W. Huck, is a civil engineer, is the mother of three sons and one daughter. The oldest, Wallace, is an honor pupil in Crane Technical high school; the youngest, Robert, is 9 years old.

Indecision by the governor over the constitutionality of an appointment to the congressmanship at large is due, Mrs. Huck said today, not to the fact that she is a woman, but that the constitution makes no provision for the vacancy caused by the death of a congressman-at-large.

"In the election; a congressman-at-large is like a senator; in duties he is like a representative," Mrs. Huck said. "Similarity between the election of a United States senator and of a congressman-at-large should put the refilling of the place of the latter in the same class as the former, my friends tell me. In that case the constitution provides for appointment by the governor."

Will Work for Children

Should Gov. Small fail to make the appointment, Mrs. Huck will not only run in a special election to fill her father's vacancy, but she will compete in the regular election for the next term.

"If I am fortunate enough to be the first woman with children to serve in Washington," Mrs. Huck said, "I will think it my duty to serve the women and children from the national end. If this country is to be a success, it must make a success of its children and give them the best of education."

The only women serving in congress up to date have been unmarried. As the youngest of Congressman "Billy" Mason's three daughters, Mrs. Huck went to school in Washington as a girl and has passed considerable time there since.
