**WILL LOCATE TWO STATE AID ROADS**

Public Hearing at Hotel Sherman Announced by State Highway Officials

The state highway department has sent notice to Chas. E. Russell, county superintendent of highways, and other Lake county persons interested, that a public hearing will be held July 29 in the Tiger room, Hotel Sherman, Chicago, at 9:30 o'clock for the purpose of determining the location of two state aid road routes in this county.

One of these routes is the Waukegan-Woodstock highway and the other is the Chicago-Antioch road. County highway officials have been working for two years to get the state highway department to locate these routes so that the county will be enabled to plan other improvements which have been delayed because these routes were indefinite.

There is a probability that the Chicago-Antioch road will be located along the St. Paul railroad right-of-way.
