ARRIVES FROM ITALY IS SPURNED BY HUSBAND

ITALIANS THREATEN HIM
Louise Bartelena Swears Out Warrant for Arrest of Vito Lamacco and Angelina de Palma
Saturday, Highwood residents were greatly distressed over the threats of the Italians of that city to kill Vito Lamacco, another Italian, whose wife had arrived from Italy and found that her husband was living with another woman.
It appears that eight years ago, Vito Lamacco left Italy to come to this country, leaving his wife, Louise Bartelena, there to care for their two children. From time to time she received letters and small remittances from him and looked forward to the time when she would come here to make her home.
About three years ago Lamacco married Angelina de Palma. Friends in Highwood, realizing that things were not as they should be, wrote to the wife in Italy informing her of her husband's action. Leaving one child in the care of the Italian relief and welfare society, she came to this country, but upon her arrival in Highwood she did not have enough money to make the trip to Highwood. However, the Italians there took up a collection and paid her way over here, the other child being left in the care of the immigration officers.
Upon her arrival in Highwood she sent a friend to inform her husband that she was here, but Lamacco informed him he would have nothing to do with her, which statement angered the Italians.
A warrant was sworn out for the arrest of Vito Lamacco and Angelina de Palma and they were released on bonds of \$500 each.
The case was brought up for trial this morning at ten o'clock before Judge Smith.

MODEL HIGH SCHOOL TO OPEN SEPT. 12th
New Feature Added to the University of Illinois at Urbana
The completion of the new education building at the University of Illinois will enable the College of Education to carry out its plans for a model high school in connection with the University. While the faculty has not been selected the school will be open to a selected group of students this fall, according to Dr. C. E. Chadsey, Dean of the College of Education.
"The University High school will be opened the 12th of September, the Monday following the opening of the Urbana and Champaign high schools," said Dean Chadsey. "This will provide the opportunity which those interested in the training of teachers in the University have desired for many years — a laboratory high school for high school teachers, an opportunity for the students of the College of Education to get practice teaching, something that all beginning teachers should have."
"The question as to tuition to be charged has not yet been settled by the Board of Trustees.
"Enrollment will be limited to two hundred and fifty. The Education Building, completed two years ago for this purpose, is one of the handsomest buildings on the campus.
"We are now selecting the faculty of the high school. It is expected that nearly all will be graduate men and women anxious to avail themselves of the opportunity to teach here and at the same time do graduate work in the University. The distinction between the University High school and other high schools will be the effort to keep the number of pupils in each class lower and the number of class periods fewer, because the regular teachers will act as critic teachers for regular students.
"Already we are receiving a great number of inquiries in regard to the admission of pupils."

WAUCONDA-VOLO ROAD PRACTICALLY ASSURED
Opening of the bids for the construction of the Wauconda-Volo concrete highway, four and six-tenths miles in length, practically assures that improvement as one bid, that of Fred Nelson, of Racine, Wis., is near the \$30,000 a mile limit the state highway department has placed upon Illinois road construction work.
The bid of Nelson was \$142,421. At the rate of \$30,000 a mile the cost would be \$138,000. Because of the nearness of the bid, it is believed the state highway department will O. K. it being only \$4,000 a mile over the state limit.
This is considered a very important improvement and the county highway department will make every effort to see that it goes through at as early a date as possible.
Whether the Green Bay road, between Washington street and Grand avenue, west of Waukegan, will be improved is doubtful as the only bid was that of the Conway construction company, their figure being \$32,164.11 for the mile to be improved.

BABIES CONFERENCE AT THE STATE FAIR

SPRINGFIELD AUG. 19-27
Many Applications Received From All Over State; Substantial Prizes are Offered
The Sixth Annual Better Babies conference to be held at the coming State Fair, August 19-27, will be the greatest in the history of this popular movement in child welfare work. Conferences have been held in many counties during the past year and the high scoring babies from these events will be entered at the State-wide conference at the State Fair. More than two hundred applications have been received from the counties of Sangamon, Christian, Mason, Macoupin, Cass, White, Macon, DeWitt, Morgan, Scott, St. Clair, Schuyler, Montgomery and Carroll.
The improvement class at the coming conference consists of 665 children under the ages of 72 months who have been examined at previous conferences. Great interest is being taken by the parents and relatives of these youngsters who anxiously await the result of this year's examination to determine the ratio of improvement made. To the parents of these children the Better Babies conference will be one of the big attractions of the State Fair.
The east balcony of the exposition building has been set aside for the conference. Restrooms for mothers and a splendidly equipped nursery for the babies have been provided. The comfort and convenience of the mothers and children have been given first consideration. The babies will not come in contact with the public, the examinations being held in well lighted rooms separated from spectators by glass partitions.
Substantial and attractive prizes are offered for the highest scoring babies. It must be remembered that the conference is no wise a "baby show." The children are weighed and measured to determine their ratio or degree of normality, and for the purpose of determining such defects as may exist. To this end children may be entered in the non-competitive class.
Entries close at midnight, Friday, August 12.

TWO SENTENCED TO PENITENTIARY TERM
Charles Johnson and William Moir Sent up for Stealing Two Barrels of Liquor
Charles Johnson and William Moir, convicted of robbing the Chicago & North Western railroad by stealing two barrels of whiskey from a car at Blodgett, were sentenced to serve from one to twenty years in the penitentiary by Judge C. C. Edwards in the circuit court.
Judge Edwards refused to grant a parole. Atty. Ernest S. Gail investigated their records following the request for parole and recommended that it be refused, which the court did.
Johnson was tried and the jury disagreed. Then he and Moir were tried together and found guilty.
In a battle with railroad detectives, Johnson was shot in the back with buckshot and his recovery was in doubt for weeks.
