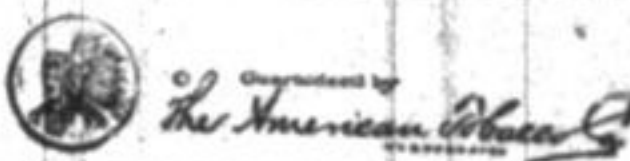

DR. P. C. WOLCOTT WRITES FROM SHIP

ENJOYING FINE TRIP

Highland Park Couple Reach Half Way Point on Way to the Far East to Visit Son

The following letter from Dr. P. C. Wolcott was received this week by the Press. Dr. and Mrs. Wolcott are on their way to visit a son in China.

China Mail, S. S. Nanking
Latitude 25.42° N, Longitude 153.53° W
Thursday, August 4, 1921.

Four weeks ago today we left Highland Park on our long journey and started west in the Sante Fe Limited. Thanks to the storm in which we set out and which was general throughout the west, we had a comfortable journey with no dust and no very great heat. We spent two days at the Grand Canyon trying to realize something of the grandeur and wonder of the vast chasm and each hour the impression grew upon us, we did not attempt to go down the trail to the river as I did upon my former visit, but motored and strolled along the rim, admiring the changing views from the different points of observation.

On Tuesday afternoon we left the train at San Bernardino where Miss Boulton met us and motored us to "Robleda", their beautiful home on the mesa at the foot of the mountains, five miles from Beaumont.

During our stay with the Boultons we made many interesting excursions. One day we drove to Riverside and had luncheon at the fascinating Mission Inn which is half hotel and half a museum of objects of art and archeology, all arranged with perfect taste. One might spend a week there with profit examining the remarkable collection, in which objects of ecclesiastical art from Mexican and Spanish churches and convents seem to predominate.

Another day we drove to San Diego about 130 miles distant, and spent three days in and about that interesting city, we particularly admired the very beautiful exposition buildings which are still standing in Balboa Park, situated in the midst of the city, these buildings are used for community purposes and it is intended to preserve them. We visited with many old Highland Park friends in this vicinity, Mr. Richard Street and his daughter, Mrs. McCauley, Mrs. Muriel Boulton Hazard and Miss

Turnley and Mr. and Mrs. Nichols, who are staying at beautiful La Jolla.

The harbor at San Diego is full of war ships, about a hundred of them, chiefly destroyers, being anchored there at the time of our visit, we also marvelled at the vast building projects the government is carrying on there for the navy, the marines and the aviation service.

From San Diego we motored back to Beaumont by another way, chiefly along the sea coast and drove 162 miles during the day, a record performance for us, and one which though delightful, we would not like to repeat too frequently. During this trip we visited the missions at San Luis Rey and San Juan Capistrano, both most interesting.

We left hospitable Rebelda reluctantly at the end of a week's visit and proceeded to Los Angeles, a wonderful young city which has grown amazingly since our visit there eight years ago. While there we saw much of Mr. Frank Thorne and Mr. and Mrs. McBean, who motored us about the city and suburban places and to the harbor and various beaches. Mr. Thorne is positively growing younger and is very happy in his beautiful new home. We spent two days with cousins in Pasadena and met many other old friends, we would have liked to linger longer under the shadow of Mount Lowe, but time was pressing and we had to move on to Santa Barbara where Dr. Henry Ullmann and his mother met us and took us to their hospitable home in Mission Canyon. The first person who greeted us as we alighted from the train was Ross Fletcher who helped us with our hand luggage to the car, here we also met Mr. and Mrs. Charles Kirk who are looking well and prosperous.

Twenty-four hours was far too short a time to devote to Santa Barbara and our hospitable friends, but we made the most of it and came away greatly impressed by the charm of the place about which it would be easy to write an entire letter. We hope to revisit it later.

We reached San Francisco on Thursday morning, a week ago today, and found a great many letters from friends awaiting us there. There were so many things to be done in preparation for our voyage that we did not have much time for visiting and sightseeing, but we did spend an afternoon and evening in Berkeley with friends and greatly admired the buildings and campus of the University of California, and not least, the Greek Theatre. We called on Mr. and Mrs. Charles Everett who were not at home, but they came to see us at our hotel the following day, they are so happy and contented in their new home that I fear we shall see but little of them in Highland Park in future.

While we were in San Francisco the weather was so cold that we had to wear our thickest clothes and the steam heat in our room was very grateful.

The "Nanking" was due to sail at one o'clock on Saturday, and well ahead of that time we made our way to pier 31 to see that all our luggage was properly stowed away on board. There was no one to see us off but we occupied ourselves reading some of our letters and telegrams and watching our fellow passengers coming aboard and the crowd on the pier.

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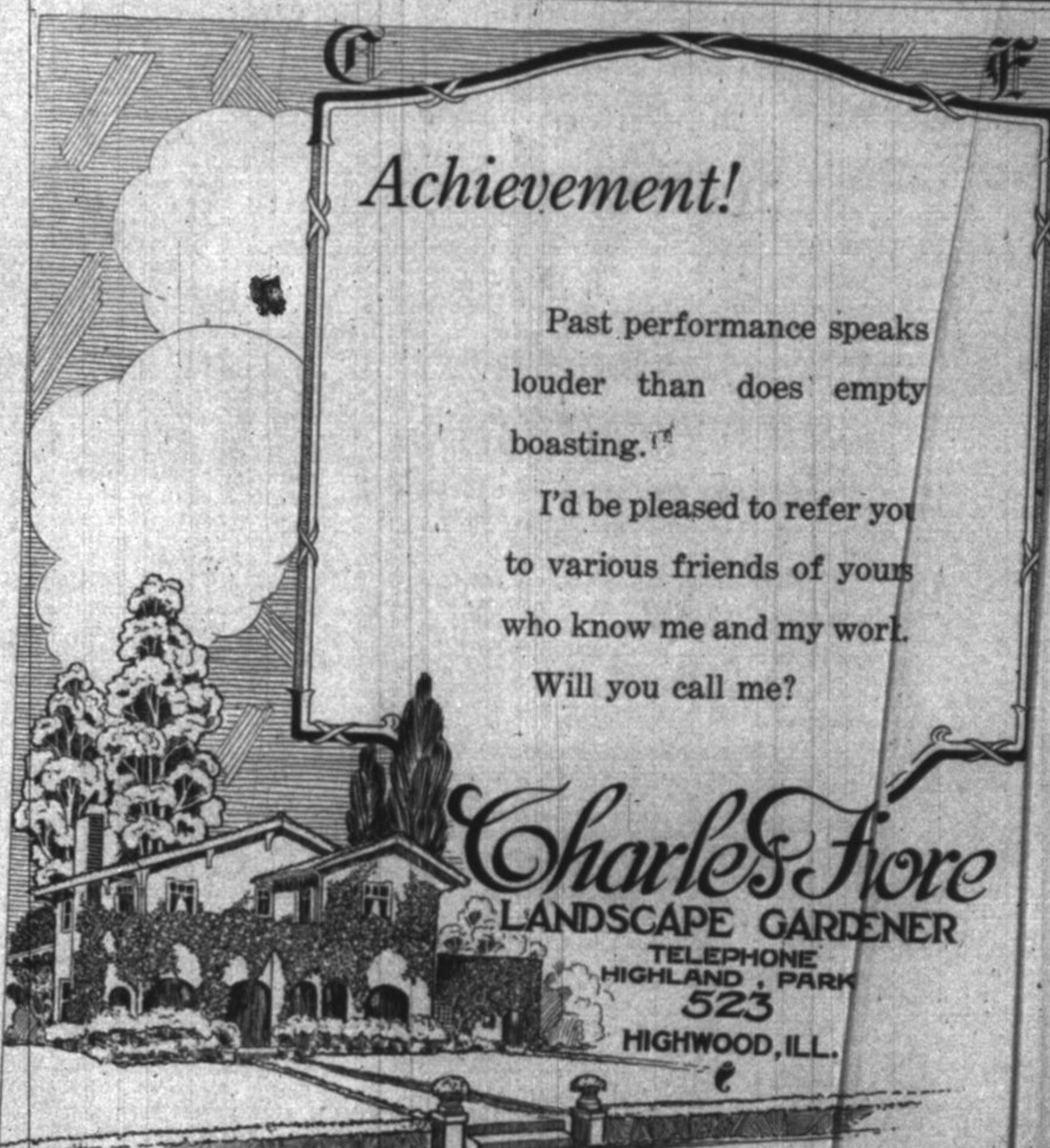
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
