VETERANS ENDORSE DISARMAMENT PLAN

Soldiers and Sailors Association Passes Resolution at Annual Reunion

Hearty endorsement of President Harding's efforts to obtain world disarmament was expressed in the form of a resolution by the patriotic organizations of Lake county assembled at Foss Park, North Chicago, to attend the forty-third annual reunion of the Lake County Soldiers' and Sailors' association.

The resolution reads as follows: Resolved: That where as the destruction of men and treasure in past wars has impoverished the nations, caused incalculable suffering and impeded the progress of mankind, therefore

Be It resolved by the Soldiers' and Sailors' association of Lake county, Ill., consisting of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Women's Relief Corps, the Daughters of the G. A. R., the Sons of Veterans, the Spanish War Veterans, the American Legion and the Women's Auxiliary of the American Legion this day assembled in North Chicago, Ill.

That we do hereby most heartily approve of the masterly effort of our president, Warren G. Harding, to limit the armaments of nations, and pledge to him our unanimous and enthusiastic support.

John W. Gorby, head of the research work of the Cyclone Fence company, World War veterans, delivered a stirring address. His remarks that stirred the association and auxiliary organizations to adopt the resolution to President Harding.

In the evening a dance was given by the Sons of Veterans, the proceeds going to defray the expenses of the reunion.

The reunion was a success from every standpoint. Hundreds of guest badges and member badges were distributed.

LIQUOR VIOLATORS GIVEN STIFF FINES

Jail Sentences Withheld Because Defendants Plead Guilty; Promise to Quit

Fines were administered to several blindpiggers and moonshiners when they appeared in court Saturday and pleaded guilty. In each case it was the first offense so consideration of the pleas of guilty and the promise not to transgress in future the defendants were let off with fines instead of jail sentences. Eckel at first pleaded "not guilty" but after thinking the matter over expressed his desire of changing the plea to "guilty."

John Wozniak pleaded not guilty and was remanded to the custody of the sheriff until he succeeds in obtaining bonds of \$2,000.
