The Open Window

Rev. Martin Luther Thomas "His windows were open toward Jerusalem — he kneeled upon his knees three times a day" — Dan. 6:10. One of our poets has said that "Prayer is the soul's sincere desire, Uttered or unexpressed, That motion of a hidden fire That trembles in the breast."

The memory and example of this great lion hearted preacher of righteousness lives today after nearly 2500 years of history have elapsed because he was fearless for the right. This old grey-haired, battle-scarred hero could not be frightened by a few hungry lions and a thousand political enemies.

Daniel, like all upright public officials who desire to be honest, found himself in trouble with the "gang." While Daniel was on the job the mountebanks could not rob Babylon's public treasury. This man could not be intimidated or bought off. They tried to impeach him on his patriotism, this also failed. There was but one more arrow left in their quiver; he must be caught in their own net, yet their children have lived on and on and we have many of them in Lake County at the present time. We have another Daniel in State's Attorney Smith of Waukegan who refuses to be either intimidated or bought off by the crooks, bootleggers and anarchists of the Fox Lake region and their political henchmen in Chicago. Every red-blooded man and woman in Lake county must spring as one man to the assistance of this modern hero and say to the forces of hell "thou shalt not pass." We must go a step further in this campaign, which must extend thruout America and say to the parlor Bolsheviks in private or in public either by act or word countenance

the violation of our laws that he is as guilty before God as the men who actually threw the bomb into the residence of this honest official. Too long for the sake of apparent harmony and peace we have allowed the violation of the laws of our land by those in high places as well as those in low places. There must and there will sweep over this nation such a storm against those who allow this condition to exist that their iniquitous ships will be driven upon the barren rocks of destruction by the wrath of the people.

Daniel maintained his life pure from the sins of Babylon by his adherence to the open window of prayer. His windows were open toward Jerusalem and from the hills of God there swept into his soul the pure air of God's eternal love, truth and justice, which enabled him to keep his soul unspotted from the contamination of Babylon. This is the only hope of all men, whether they be private or public men; God must be acknowledged, not merely negatively, but positively in the life. Then let me be thrown to the lions or my body burned and my ashes scattered from a thousand hills I will sing:

"Right forever on the gallows,
Wrong forever on the throne,
But the gallows sways the future
and behind the rim unknown,
Stands God, keeping guard
Above his own."

Next Sunday morning, we hope that the Rev. Charles K. Osborn, pastor of the River Forest Presbyterian church, will be with us and preach. Mr. Osborn for a number of years was pastor of this church and is greatly beloved by the people. Plan to hear him.

Rev. Thomas and Prof. Wayne Thomas leave on Thursday with twenty Boy Scouts for the annual camp on the Sexton farm close to Lake Villa. Next Sunday afternoon will be visitors' day. All who have cars and are interested in the Scouts ought to drive up. It is a most beautiful spot. Just before arrival at Villa, turn to the road leading north which is marked "Deep Lake," then proceed north for about one mile until you come to the Sexton farm, then turn west down the lane and this will take you to the camp. Bring your lunch, the Scouts will furnish hot cocoa or coffee.

The evening services begin the first Sunday evening in September, plan to hear the first of a series of evening addresses on the Home. The first address will be upon the "Ideal Home," the second on "The Ideal Father, Who is He?", the third, "The Ideal Young Woman, Does She Live in Deerfield?", the fourth, "The Ideal Mother, Does the Home Bring Gray Hairs?", the fifth, "The Ideal Young Man, Does He Exist?"
