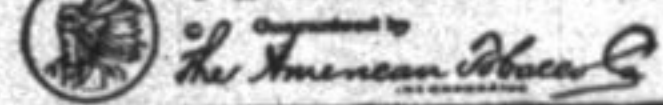

HOLD CHAUFFEUR IN MILTIMORE CASE

Man Who Drove Miss Clark to Orlando After Robbery is Jailed

Word comes from Orlando, Fla., to the effect that Patterson, the man who drove the car in which Miss Clarke drove from West Palm Beach to Orlando after her theft of \$32,000 of postal money, has been held to the grand jury in \$5,000 bonds.

He is charged with being an accessory and was held in jail a week before he could get bail.

Miss Clarke, it is recalled, is the woman who killed Fred Miltimore of Waukegan and the mystery of the big sum of money and her shooting of Miltimore has as yet been unsolved. Very little of the money has been recovered.

Just what part the police feel that Patterson played in the case is not known. It is remembered that Miss Clarke gave him \$400 for driving her 45 miles to Orlando.

VACATION READING
