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MOIR'S BONDS MAY BE FORFEITED

Blodgett Robber Fails to Appear at Specified Time; Capias is Issued

Unless William Moir, convicted freight car robber, surrenders himself this week his bond of \$3,000 will be forfeited. State's Attorney A. V. Smith last Friday filed a motion with Circuit Judge Edwards asking for a forfeiture of the bond because Moir has disappeared. The court decided to give Moir until September 8. At the same time Judge Edwards ordered a capias for the arrest of the missing man and this was turned over to the sheriff.

Moir, in connection with Charles Johnson, was convicted of trying to steal two barrels of whiskey out of a freight car at Blodgett on the North Western railroad a year or more ago. Both were sentenced to serve from one to twenty years in the state penitentiary.

At the time Johnson disappeared and his \$2,000 cash bond was declared forfeited. Later Johnson came back with an excuse as to why he had not appeared sooner and now occupies a cell in the county jail, waiting to be taken to prison.

Moir asked permission two or three weeks ago to go to Chicago and arrange his affairs. He was to return within a few days. Nothing more has been heard from him.

LOCAL CONTRIBUTORS TOLD OF SUFFERING

Near East Relief Officer Pictures Conditions in Bible Lands; More Grain Needed

Contributors to the work of the Near East Relief who reside in this county are receiving copies of cablegrams sent from the Bible lands to the effect that corn products made from the gift corn contributed by the farmers of Illinois last season were being unloaded at the Port of Batoum on the Black Sea from the steamship Datchet while a party of Americans was there. The cablegram was sent by Charles V. Vickery, general secretary of the Near East Relief, who with other Americans, is inspecting the work of relief being done in the 220 orphanages, sixty hospitals and numerous refugee camps whose support is made possible by contributions from the American people.

"Children outside our orphanages were dying on the streets of starvation while we were there in August," reads the cablegram. "The winter will bring indescribable suffering. Ev-

ery pound of flour, rice, beans, corn-flour or hominy on the Datchet, Esther Dellar or other relief ship means life to some child or helpless exile.

"The people are naturally industrious and help themselves wherever possible but the continuous warfare, prolonged exile and the occupation of territory by enemy forces until too late to plant crops, have rendered the refugees destitute and helpless. All supplies are kept under continuous control of experienced American Relief workers, and economical effective distribution to starving refugees is assured. Need is practically unlimited."

A campaign has been launched to induce the farmers of the United States and Canada to contribute five million bushels of grain to help feed the starving people of the Bible lands. Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas is chairman of the national committee composed of representative agriculturists.

Illinois farmers are being asked to contribute one bushel of grain of every one hundred bushels raised. Cash contributions may be sent to the Illinois headquarters of the Near East Relief, 19 S. LaSalle St., Chicago.

"FIREBUGS" ATTEMPT TO DESTROY HOUSE

Home of Waukegan Man Soaked With Kerosene and Set on Fire

The home of Clayton Luyster, on Western avenue, north of Glen Flora avenue, Waukegan, was set on fire shortly before 9:00 o'clock Friday night, and but for the timely arrival of two colored men who were nearby and fought the blaze with pails of water until the fire department arrived, the place would have been burned to the ground. Fire Chief Lars O'Farrel has notified the state fire marshal at Springfield.

Is a Plain Case

It is a plain case of incendiarism, according to Waukegan authorities. Everything in the entire house, including beds and bedding, rugs, clothing, lace curtains and all the furniture were soaked with kerosene. Large bundles of kerosene-soaked rugs were scattered about the various rooms. The fire was burning in four or five rooms when the firemen arrived. All the clothing was completely burned and the furniture, including a piano, was destroyed or charred so badly that it is a complete loss.
