GOOD CROWDS EVERY DAY

President of Association Enthusiastic Over Outcome; Thousands Jammed Midway Friday Night

The 68th annual Lake County Fair at Libertyville, went over the top this year with flying colors. The fair was a success, financially as well as otherwise. Enough money was made to pay all the expenses and leave some to take care of old bills. Just how much money was made this year has not yet been determined and will not be until a formal financial report has been made out. Fred Grabbe, president of the fair association, John Wirtz, secretary and J. N. Rouse, treasurer, are authorities for the statement that the Fair went over the top.

Grabbe is Pleased
Mr. Grabbe makes the following statement:

"The Fair this year has gone over the top—we have made some money, just how much we do not know as yet. At this time I desire to thank the people of Lake county for their liberal patronage which made the Fair a success. I desire also to extend my thanks to the officers and directors of the association for their loyal co-operation."

Big Fireworks Display
As predicted the Fair ended in a blaze of splendor. The fireworks display on the closing night was the most wonderful of the week. The choicest set pieces were selected for the final evening's display.

The midway on the closing night was jammed with people. Standing out clearly was the fact that the fair association had more than made good on every promise. The fair was even better than they had promised. It was not allowed to fizzle out at the end like some fairs. The program for the last day and evening was as good, if not better than on other days and nights during the week.

Had No Accidents
In a fair running five days and nights it is most remarkable that there were no accidents. Not one accident took place during the Fair. Likewise the fair was kept absolutely clean. The midway attractions were kept up to a high standard and no objectionable gambling games were seen. This was due in part to the splendid police protection.

Races Were Good
No account of the fair could be complete without something being said about the races. The race program this year was unusually good and proved to be one of the best drawing cards.

All the exhibits were bigger and better than ever before. The entry list was larger than ever and this caused more of an expense to the association. The fair has grown to a marked extent and must be considered in larger figures in the future.
