SALVATION ARMY IN DRIVE FOR \$5,000.00

Money Needed to Carry on the Year's Work in Lake County

Adjutant Ketchum of the Salvation Army, Thursday evening, Sept. 15, called a meeting of the advisory board of the Salvation Army in Lake County in the Salvation Army Hotel, Waukegan, where a dinner was served and then steps were taken to reorganize the board and preliminary action was outlined for a campaign to raise \$5,000 for the coming year's work in Lake County.

About 15 men were present out of a committee of 27 and others who could not attend sent assurance that they would co-operate in anything that was done.

T. J. Stahl was elected chairman of the advisory board in place of Charles N. Steele, who remains on the board, but who declined to act as chairman. The vice-chairman is Col. A. V.
