Miss Margaret Kress was the week end guest of Miss Florence Corcoran of Everett.

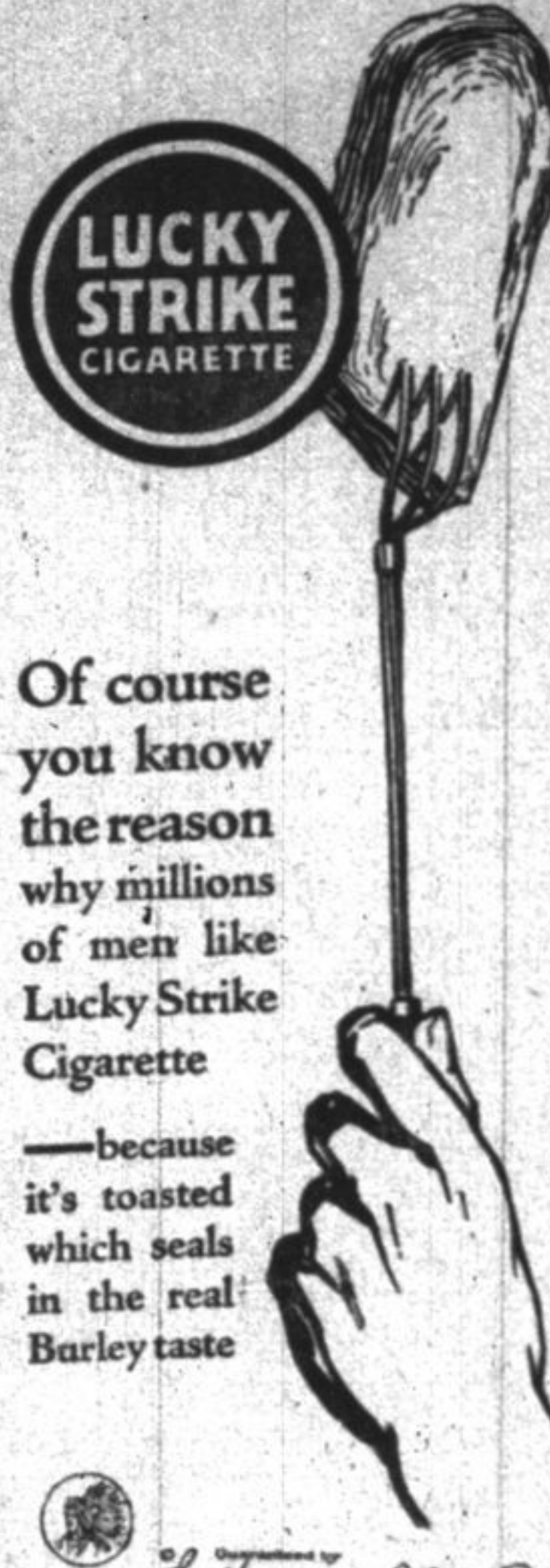

Mr. Harry Muhle worked at Rockford, Ill., last week.

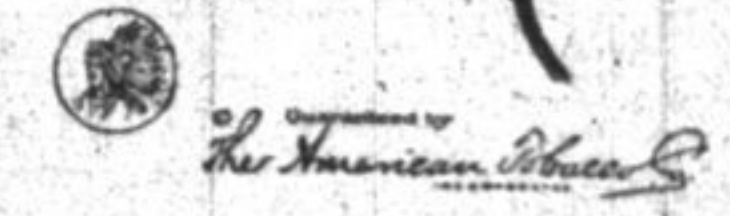
Mrs. Oscar Beecham has been quite ill for the past two weeks, but is much better now.
