#### MORE MONEY FOR SCHOOL

Voters in School District 107 have an opportunity Saturday afternoon to bring the Elm Place school out of its financial difficulties. An election will be held for the purpose of allowing the public to decide whether or not the district shall increase its total levy for school purposes. This increase is made possible by a law passed last July by the legislature. The Board of Education has announced its inability to maintain the Elm Place school with its present efficiency unless greater school revenues are forthcoming. Greater maintenance expenses during the last few years have left the institution with no margin of revenue. More money must be had. Every citizen who is interested in the welfare of the school and the community should vote for the increase. The polls will be open at the Elm Place building Saturday afternoon from one o'clock to six.

#### BALLOT ON SCHOOL INCREASE SATURDAY (Continued from Page one)

The Board of Education of District 107 has publicly announced its inability to maintain Elm Place school with its present efficiency unless greater school revenues are forthcoming. The great increase in maintenance expenses of recent years corresponding with the general rise in the price of commodities, cost of living, salary increases, etc., found the district with no margin of revenue to employ in meeting the situation. A year and a half ago the Board of Education called a mass meeting of citizens to consider the situation. The teachers had asked for an increase in salary and strong pressure was being brought to bear upon the Board by earnest patrons of the school to secure for the teachers the increase asked for. More than one plan was advanced to augment the income of the district but no one advocated reducing the activities of the school. It was finally decided to defer action until after the coming session of the legislature. It was known that the school situation in Highland Park was a counterpart of that in hundreds of cities in the state and it was confidently expected that relief might ultimately be obtained through legislative action. The action of this meeting of citizens seems to have been justified. If on Saturday afternoon the citizens in District 107 avail themselves of the benefits possible under the law above cited, the Board of Education, by levying the maximum for the coming year, will be able to wipe out practically all of the deficit which has been accumulating for more than two years. It will then be able at some future time to propose a building program with the certainty that there will be sufficient revenue in its yearly income to maintain the new building for which its present and prospective enrollment calls. It does not seem possible that the school patrons of District 107 will be satisfied to withhold from the support of the school the additional revenue so badly needed. The election is to be held at the Elm Place building Saturday afternoon, Oct. 15, between the hours of one and six. The Board of Education is asking for a large vote in favor of the proposition. The Elm Place P. T. A. headed by its president, Mrs. George W. Childs, is making a thorough canvass to get out the vote and the Committee of One Hundred Five that had its origin at the mass meeting mentioned above is co-operating in the work.

#### SALVATION ARMY TO RAISE \$1,000 HERE

APPEAL MADE THIS WEEK  
No Special Committee Will Be Appointed; Contributions May Be Sent to the City Hall

The Salvation Army is calling upon Highland Park people once more to assist them in raising funds to carry on their relief and social service work throughout Lake county for the ensuing year. During this week there will be a drive carried on in Highland Park to raise \$1,000.00. No doubt citizens of Highland Park will respond to this call when they consider the good work done annually by the Salvation Army. During last winter 3,043,418 pounds of coal were piled by the Salvation Army in back yards where little children and sad-eyed mothers were shivering; the Salvation Army officers found work for 52,219 men and 13,034 women, in addition to those to whom they gave employment in their own institutions; and they reached 33,000,000 persons through their street meetings last year, a third of whom never have heard a sermon or a hymn except for the Salvationists. The Salvation Army is depending upon the generosity of Highland Park for its full quota of \$1,000.00 and is confident that Highland Park will not fall them at this time. The appeal for funds was made to Mayor Hastings and he feels that it will not be necessary to appoint a special committee to canvass the city for this small amount. Contributions should be sent in promptly, addressed to the Salvation Army, city hall. An official receipt covering the amount of subscription will be mailed each donor.
