PROBABLE JURORS FOR GOV. SMALLS TRIAL

NAMES ARE MADE PUBLIC

More Panels May Be Needed; Governor Makes Reservations at Salvation Army Hotel

Names of members of the October and November panels of petit jurors for Lake county from which may be drawn the twelve men who will try Governor Small and Verne Curtis at Waukegan next month were made public last week.

That additional panels will have to be drawn before a jury is selected is regarded as a certainty, for every man who is drawn for service will be subjected to the closest scrutiny. His whole life and his antecedents will be delved into by counsel for the state and the defense.

Prosecution of Governor Small and Mr. Curtis on the indictments procured by State's Attorney C. Fred Mortimer, paid attorney of the Chicago surface lines, will cost Sangamon County taxpayers at least \$10,000, it is estimated.

Judge E. S. Smith, from whom the change of venue was taken, placed the cost at this mark.

Aids for Wilkerson
James H. Wilkerson, chief aid of Attorney General Brundage and personal counsel of Henry A. Blair, president of the Chicago Surface Lines, will take a leading part in the prosecution. Others assisting will be A. V. Smith, states attorney of Lake County, and Edward Pree and James Weldon, assistant state's attorneys of Sangamon county.

Civil suits to compel Governor Small, Lieutenant Governor Fred E. Sterling, Auditor of Public Accounts, Andrew J. Russel and William Ryan Jr., to account for funds entrusted to them while state treasurers probably will be filed within a week. Attorney General Brundage announced yesterday.

Small Reserves Hotel Rooms
Governor Small probably will remain in Waukegan throughout his trial, it was indicated when it was learned that the Governor had made a tentative reservation for a suite of rooms at the Salvation Army hotel. When Waukegan was first selected it was at first believed the Governor and his attorneys would spend their nights in Chicago.

BRUNDAKE AGENTS MAKE INVESTIGATION

Check List of Men Likely to be Called for Jury Service At Small Trial

Two veteran investigators from the office of Attorney General Brundage were in Waukegan Saturday making a careful check-up of the complete ten per cent of voters of Lake county who are likely to be called for jury service in the trial of Gov. Len Small for the embezzlement of state funds.

They had already been furnished with a list of the names that remained in the jury box but for the fact that the complete list of 10 per cent is being taken indicates that any venireman who is accepted on the jury will first go through a maelstrom of questioning. As a result it will take weeks to complete the jury.

Clark, Special Prosecutor
Attorney Elam L. Clarke, veteran Waukegan lawyer Saturday was named by State's Attorney Mortimer

of Sangamon country to act as local aid in the prosecution. He is a member of the Constitution Convention, and former master in chancery and president of the Lake county Bar association.

Rep. Wm. F. Weiss of Waukegan, who also was named as aid in the prosecution, who is arranging things here for the trial, declared today in an interview: "The State will do nothing to interfere with a speedy trial and our purpose is to get ready at the earliest possible moment. I doubt if the trial will begin before Nov. 1, as first hinted, because the transcript of the records from Sangamon county is a huge task."

George H. Bairstow, secretary of the Waukegan-North Chicago Chamber of Commerce Saturday declared that the fact that Gov. Small will be tried here will in no way affect the plans that were made some time ago to have him participate in the celebration of the opening of Green Bay road, which gives Waukegan a concrete highway to Chicago in addition to Sheridan Road.

"The opening of this road is not going to be a political love feast," Chairman Bairstow declared. So far as I am concerned he is entitled to every consideration. We also are planning to extend an invitation to

Gov. Phillips of Wisconsin. Practically every organization in this locality will participate in the celebration and if possible it will take place on Armistice Day and probably will include the planting of a few memorial trees."
