#### 200 REGISTER IN EVENING CLASSES

#### In Spite of Storm Monday Evening, Many Attend Opening of Night School at H. S.

The Evening High School opened Monday night, October 17, at a quarter before 8 o'clock. The night was very stormy and only one notice had been issued concerning the opening of the school. However, in spite of these difficulties, there were nearly 200 students on hand. Classes were organized in Salesmanship, Business English, Bookkeeping, Arithmetic, Typewriting, Auto-Repairing and gymnasium work, as well as swimming and Mechanical Drawing.

Owing to the fact that classes in Americanization are being held at the Highland Park Community Center, it had been thought that English for foreigners might be dispensed with, but there was an eager group from Lake Forest, evidently advance agents of a still larger group who desire the work very much.

Work in millinery will come on Tuesday evenings only. The first class in millinery will be held Tuesday night of next week. Sewing will be taught on Monday and Thursday.

The Auto-Repairing course will also come on Monday and Thursday, and Electricity will fill in the hours on Tuesday evenings.

The first class in Household Arts will be organized for sewing on Thursday evening of this week.

Classes in Musical Appreciation, Chorus work and Glee Club will not be organized until next week, Monday night. These will occupy only one evening a week. This is also true of Band practice which will come on Tuesday evenings only.

The young business men and women of this vicinity have a truly splendid opportunity presented to them this winter at the free evening high school. Mr. Joseph B. Garnett of Highland Park is offering a course in salesmanship. Mr. Garnett is a successful business man and a veteran salesman. He is also a graduate of Northwestern university and has had experience as a teacher in public school work. The class will follow as a text book "Read's Salesmanship." Practical problems and actual problems in spelling will come up in the class work. The forward looking clerk and business man will not pass up an opportunity like this. On Thursday night of this week Mr. Garnett takes charge of the class which was organized by Miss Proudfoot. Work begins at twenty minutes before eight and ends at twenty minutes to nine on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

Lovers of music will hail with delight the formation of a class in musical appreciation to meet on Monday evenings at the high school. The class will meet at a quarter before eight under the direction of Mr. Hubert Conover. Mr. Conover will ask local musicians to assist him in rendering the works of composers, before the class, and he will lecture on the work. He also plans in another class in part singing to produce during the winter some cantatas, light operas, or oratorios which the class will be very much interested in. These classes in music as in all other cases are free to the public.

#### JOURNALISM POPULAR AT U. OF ILLINOIS

Urbana, Ill., Oct. (Special) — Is newspaper work drawing more young men and young women to it because of its undying fascination? It must be. Listen:

The largest enrollment in journalism courses in the history of the University of Illinois is announced this year. A total of 228 students is enrolled. Of this number, 157 are taking the introductory course in which they learn something of the working of a newspaper and something about news writing. There are 12 in the copy reading and head writing course, 37 doing editorial writing and 22 are studying the history of American journalism.

Dr. Franklin W. Scott is director of the University's courses in journalism.

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois having ordered that a four (4) inch water main, with fire hydrants, valves, valve boxes and special castings be constructed and laid in, along and under Glencoe Avenue and Gray Avenue, connecting and beginning with the present water main in Lincoln Avenue, located twenty (20) feet north of the south line of said Lincoln Avenue at a point nineteen (19) feet west of the Easterly line of Glencoe Avenue produced Northwesterly; thence South in Glencoe Avenue on a line parallel to and nineteen (19) feet Westwesterly from the Easterly line of said Avenue to the intersection of a line nineteen (19) feet south of and parallel with the North line of Gray Avenue; thence East parallel to the North line of Gray Avenue to an intersection with the present water main laid in the Easterly side of Elmhurst Drive, all in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of said city and having applied to the County Court of Lake county for an assessment of the costs of said improvement according to benefits, and an assessment thereof having been made and returned to said court, the final hearing thereon will be had on the 5th day of November, A. D. 1924, or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit.

Said assessment is payable in ten installments, with interest at the rate of five (5) per centum per annum on all installments from and after date of issue of first voucher. All persons desiring may file objections in said court before said day and may appear on the hearing and make their defense.
