## HIGHLAND PARK WILL BACK UP PRESIDENT

### TO PREPARE A MEMORIAL

#### Citizens of Highland Park Back of Movement to Impress Imperative Need of Disarmament

The coming conference in Washington, called by President Harding to devise means for the limitation of the world's armaments is destined to be one of the most important events in all history. Its success will usher in a new era for the nations of the earth for all time to come.

Its failure means further war and a blow to civilization for untold years ahead.

What the next war would mean appalls one even to think of.

Germany has been compelled to disarm and is now relieved from the enormous burden which her armaments imposed upon her. Her yearly payments for reparations are less than what either France, England or America has elected to spend the past year on their respective armaments. In view of this fact it is not a fair question whether Germany will not be the winner after all?

Over 90 per cent of our present huge national expenditure is on account of war, either for the maintenance of our present armaments or for the costs of past wars. This question is not merely, or even chiefly, an economical one, but it is even more a moral one. The monetary cost of the world war can be paid in time, but who can estimate how many decades it will take the nations to recover from the moral losses entailed by the conflict?

The coming conference will never prove a success if left solely to the guidance of the national leaders who are gathering at Washington. There (Continued on Page 10)

### PLANS MADE FOR PARTY

#### Members of Highwood Organization to Be Guests of Local Association Here Tuesday

The members of the Highwood Business Men's association will be guests of the Highland Park Business Men's association at a party to be held in Witten hall Tuesday, Nov. 1. The regular monthly session of the local organization will be held at eight o'clock. After the business has been taken care of there will be entertainment and lunch. ### COMMITEES ARE NAMED

#### Community Center Plans Big Annual Drive for Funds Nov. 14-20; Expect Good Response

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of Community Service held last Monday evening it was decided to set aside the week of November 14 to 19 for the annual drive for the year's budget. The fiscal year begins Nov. 1, and next year's budget must be raised promptly in order to carry out the larger program for the community.

Mayor S. M. Hastings was selected to head the drive officially as chairman, and Mrs. Thomas R. Wyles was appointed vice-chairman. Assisting them as an executive committee will be the entire board of directors. Messrs. William Bowden, John L. Udell, and Harry Eichler were appointed as a publicity committee, and Mrs. W. A. Alexander, Mrs. Thomas R. Wyles and Mrs. Howard Wrenn were appointed the office and clerical committee.

## GARAGE MECHANIC COMMITS SUICIDE

### Body of Joseph Smigoski Found Saturday Morning; Inhaled Chloroform

Joseph Smigoski, 20, an employe at Carlson's garage, was found dead on Sunday morning. At an inquest held Sunday at the Prior undertaking establishment it was decided that the youth had committed suicide by inhaling chloroform. He had purchased a two ounce bottle of chloroform Saturday evening.

The reason for suicide is not known. The boy has been in good health, and was apparently in the best of spirits. He had been employed at the Carlson garage since last July. About a year ago he attended Deerfield-Shields high school. His father, an army sergeant, was then at Fort Sheridan. At present he is stationed at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indianapolis, Ind.

Smigoski's body was found in the room which he occupied above the garage. Frank Carlson, wanting to arouse Smigoski Sunday morning. He was assisted by Charles Wayman. When they finally entered the room, and discovered the body, they immediately notified the police department. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning, and burial was in Fort Sheridan cemetery.

## RAVINE DRIVE SUB-DIVISION A CREDIT

### Owners of Property Plan to Make This an Exclusive Residence District

The new subdivision of the eastern portion of the old Academy property at Ravine drive and Linden avenue is to be an exclusive and high grade residence improvement entirely in keeping with its location on the most beautiful drive on the north shore.

Assurance of this fact comes in a communication from Le Roy Hennessey, local representative of J. L. and Le Roy F. Harris, owners and purchasers of the property from Col. Royal P. Davidson, who says: "The four and a half acres of this tract have been subdivided into thirty large, desirable lots, most of which will front on the new drive cutting into the tract diagonally to the northeast from Ravine drive. The lots will be sold only for high class residences with restrictions and improvements that will make the property a fitting addition to an already beautiful environment. The minimum building cost will be \$10,000 over and above the cost of the lot, and building plans will be subject to approval before title is passed to purchasers.

"It is the intention of the operators of the project to maintain in every way a desirable character of the venture, and they wish their intention to be known to residents of Highland Park before rumors to the contrary arouse opposition to their plan. Mr. Le Roy F. Harris expects soon to become a permanent resident of Highland Park and will, for that reason, as well as to insure success of his operations here, see to it that the property, which includes several of the most desirable ravine sites to be found anywhere, matches up with the surroundings. The owners will be thankful to the Highland Park Press if it will carry this message to its readers."

Deerfield opened the game by kicking to New Trier. Turner of New Trier fumbled the ball on their 15 yard line. One of the ever alert Deerfield ends pounced on the ball. On the second play a short pass from McBride to Seymour resulted in a touchdown. Steele missed goal.
