Candy Day is to be regularly observed from now on. Probably Dyspepsia Day will follow as a logical conclusion.

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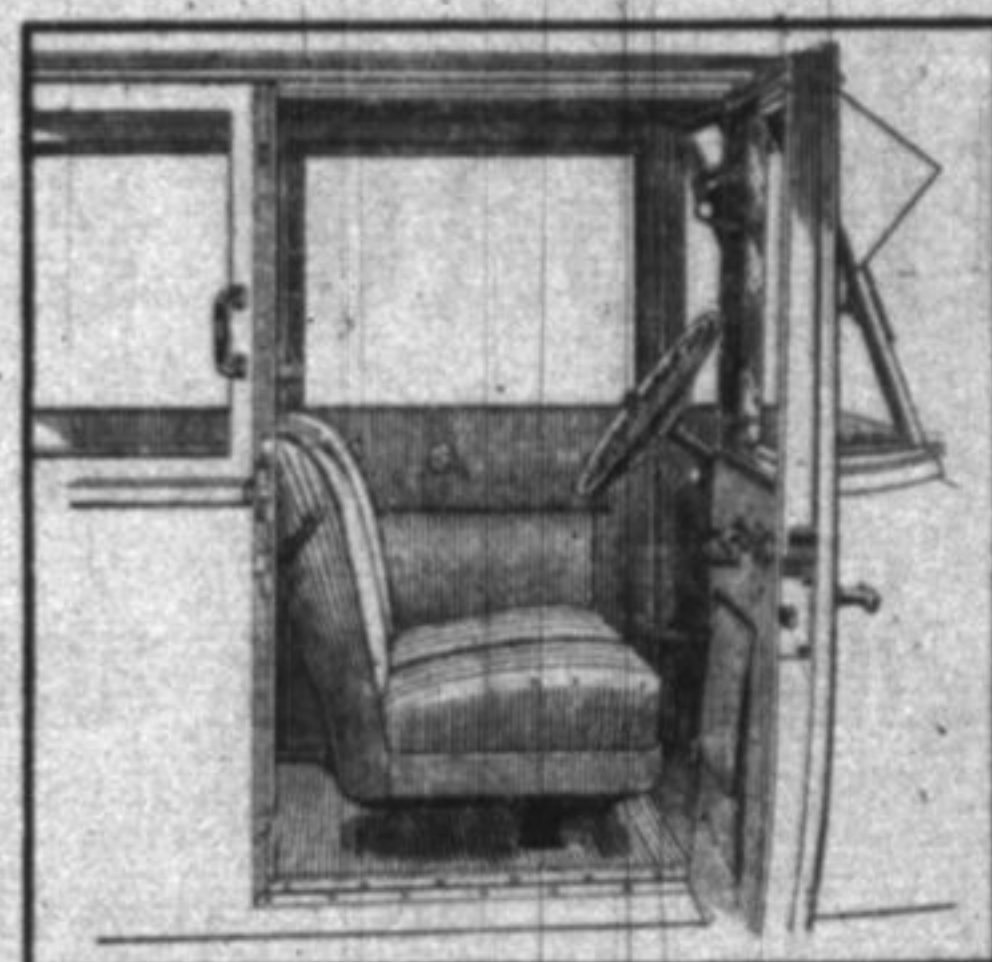
