HIGHLAND PARK FOR DISARMAMENT

Every citizen in Highland Park in the near future will be asked to sign a memorial which is to be sent Armistice Day to President Harding, which will express the hope of the people of the vicinity that the International Conference at Washington decide upon immediate and extensive limitation of all armaments. A copy of the memorial is being sent to every organization in this city, civic, business, social, and religious, and an effort will be made to have every citizen, man and woman, sign the document. A number of prominent residents have already affixed their signatures to it.

According to press reports yesterday, America, through its delegation, will have ready to submit to the assembled powers a comprehensive plan for limitation of world armaments on an equitable and just basis, this plan, to be used as the vehicle for discussion of reduction of armament.

Unless the nations of the world are able to come to terms in the big International Conference at Washington, all will doubtless be obliged to continue sinking millions of dollars each year into preparations for war. With all the greater nations preparing for combat and piling up armament it is but a question of time before they will be embroiled in another big conflict, and the "Great War" of 1914 will have been fought in vain. Instead of a "war to end wars" it will be merely a stepping stone to a more destructive combat.

War brings good to no one. No sane nation or individual wants war. Yet petty jealousies and covetousness continually lead one people into battle with another.

If men could get together and thresh out their differences in a big international conference many of the difficulties that lead to war could be settled before they had grown large. Whether or not the big conference about to begin at Washington will accomplish this forward step remains to be seen. If it can effect an extensive reduction of armaments, this gathering will accelerate the progress of civilization many centuries.

During the next two weeks every citizen of Highland Park will be asked to sign the memorial which will express to President Harding the hope of this community that disarmament will be accomplished.

ORGANIZE TEACHER TRAINING SCHOOL HERE

Local Sunday School Teachers and Parents Meet at U. E. Church Tuesdays

Four Highland Park Sunday Schools and two of Deerfield have joined interests in establishing a training course for teachers and parents. The plan was started by the Deerfield Township Sunday School Association, with the superintendents of the various schools as an executive board. The plan includes three separate courses. The first is a general course on "The Teaching of Religion," presented by Miss Marion O. Hawthorne, Field Director of Religious Education at Northwestern University. Miss Hawthorne has taught this course in other schools in a most excellent way so teachers and parents have only to enroll and attend this course to obtain certain value. The reading book for this course is "How to Teach Religion," by Geo. H. Betts. This book has been one of the best sellers in religious circles the past year. Miss Hawthorne will also teach a course suited to the needs of teachers of children up to the age of twelve. It may be called an elementary course on the religion of childhood. As evidence of her fitness to teach this course she has the degree of master of arts from Teachers College, Columbia University. Parents especially will obtain great inspiration and help in teaching and training their own children by taking these two courses with Miss Hawthorne.

During the latter half of the evening another course will be given by one of the staff of Garrett Biblical Institute. It will deal with teaching the fundamental truths of the Bible, and will be more suited for adults and their teachers.

The school will be held weekly on Tuesday, beginning at 7:30 p. m. at the United Evangelical church, and will continue for seven weeks, closing before the holidays. An enrollment fee of only \$1.00 is asked for the whole term for either one or two courses.

Highland Park people will be able to get expert teaching in this school at slight expense and minimum effort. All parents, teachers and workers in the community are cordially invited to attend.
