MRS. CLARENCE SMITH RETURNS FROM CEYLON

Mrs. Clarence G. Smith of Colombo, Ceylon, arrived Sunday at the home of her parents Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Holabird of Ft. Sheridan, having arrived in New York Friday, on the S.S. Aquitania. Mrs. Smith was called home owing to the illness of her mother.

Last March Mr. and Mrs. Smith sailed from San Francisco, visited Japan, China, Java and Federated Malay States and went to Ceylon where Mr. Smith has his headquarters. Mrs. Smith reports that she has sailed the Bay of Bengal, for going from Calcutta, India, to Rangoon, Burma, in monsoon weather is a never-to-be-forgotten experience. She says Kipling knew what he was talking about when he wrote "Pagett M. P." for that is a true description of Calcutta climate. "Someone should sell tarvia to Bombay, India," says Mrs. Smith, "for although it is a great industrial city and has beautiful buildings, the dust simply ruins the city."

Mrs. Smith left Colombo, Ceylon, Sept. 19, on the Australian boat Naldra, stopping at Aden, Persia, Port Said, Messina, Italy, and Marseilles, France. From there she went to Paris, then to Callais and London where she took the liner Aquitania for America. Mrs. Smith claims London to be the city of cities.

Among those on board the Aquitania returning to America were Admiral Beatty, Veniselos, Constantine's prime minister, Mary Garden and her mother and the retiring American consul of Ceylon and his wife.

Mr. Smith is still in the Far East where he is putting in an organization for his company.
