MANY HAVE SIGNED ARMISTICE MEMORIAL

SUPPORT IS UNANIMOUS

Document Will be Finished and Sent to President Warren G. Harding Early Next Week

The memorial which will be sent to President Harding Armistice Day, endorsing the purposes of the Conference for the limitation of armaments has met with the universal and hearty approval of the entire community, according to those in charge.

Every church, every club, and every fraternal organization is presenting the memorial to its members for signature. The city council has approved it, and likewise the Business Men's association.

Probably never before has a paper of this kind met with such universal support by all the organizations in Highland Park. This fact alone has made the proposition well worth while, if it accomplishes nothing more.

It is earnestly desired that every possible signature be placed on the paper. If a person is a member of more than one organization he should sign for each, so that each body may be represented by the full weight of its membership.

Sheets for signing may be obtained at any of the banks, the post office, the railroad stations, at drug stores, and elsewhere. Next Sunday, each of the churches will have blanks for signing.

All signatures must be in early next week, so that the Memorial may be sent to Washington in time for the opening of the Conference November 12th.

DEERFIELD WINS FROM LA GRANGE

LEADS SUBURBAN LEAGUE

Large Crowd Saw Crack Local Squad Tramp on Conquerors of Oak Park

Deerfield-Shields high school decisively established its place as the strongest contender and most probable winner in the race for the Suburban High School league championship last Saturday by defeating La Grange 40 to 0 on the same field where Coach Osborne's men jumped into prominence by upsetting Oak Park.

The field was rain-soaked, and greatly handicapped the successful execution of many plays. After the first half both teams seemed to have been immersed in a mud bath. The condition of the field, however, failed to stop the Deerfield boys. After the kick-off, Deerfield secured the ball on La Grange's forty yard line, when a La Grange man failed to make the necessary advance. A short pass from Stewart to Seymour placed the ball within the ten yard line. McBride went through center for the first touchdown. Steele missed goal.

Before the quarter was over Baldwin had gone over after the ball had been taken down the field on straight football. Baldwin kicked goal. In the second quarter Stewart got away for a twenty yard run around (Continued on Page 16)

Proclamation

WHEREAS, Friday the Eleventh day of November is the anniversary of the cessation of hostilities in the World War and the declaration of an Armistice between the warring nations, and

WHEREAS, There is soon to convene in Washington a conference of the representatives of the Great Nations of the World to the end that some way may be found toward a permanent peace by the limitation of armaments, and

WHEREAS, Petitions in the form of a Memorial are being prepared to be presented to President Harding at the Conference on Limitation of Armaments, urging the national hope and expectation that the Conference will provide for an immediate and decided limitation of world armaments.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Samuel M. Hastings, Mayor of Highland Park hereby call upon the citizens of Highland Park to observe Armistice Day on Friday, the Eleventh day of November, A. D. Nineteen Hundred and Twenty-One by flying the flag of our Country and at Eleven o'clock in the forenoon, by standing uncovered for a period of two minutes and offering a silent prayer for the success of the Disarmament Conference, that those who gave their lives for humanity shall not have died in vain, and

I HEREBY FURTHER urge all the Citizens of Highland Park to sign the petitions now circulated to be presented to President Harding at the International Conference, urging that such action may be taken on the limitation of armaments as will result in the first step toward a world peace.

ARMISTICE DAY TO BE CELEBRATED HERE

Ceremony to be Held in Front of Community Service at Eleven O'clock

Highland Park will have its share in the general observance of Armistice Day. Community Service of Highland Park is arranging a beautiful and significant ceremony, to be held at 11 o'clock on the morning of November 11. The exercises will be held in front of the Community Center at the corner of Central avenue and Sheridan road, and will be beautiful and inspiring. The pupils of the different schools will be asked to march to the Center, and all homes and business houses will fly the Stars and Stripes. All citizens are requested to wear some kind of a flower as a part of the general observance.

Promptly at 11 the siren will be sounded which will be the signal for a pause of two minutes throughout the town. During the two minutes' silence period the church bells will ring. The audience assembled at the Center will be addressed by the Hon. S. M. Hastings, Mayor of Highland Park, and opening prayer and benediction will be said by ministers of Highland Park. Schwartz of the same city, representing the firm of Henry Schwartz, diamond brokers of international reputation, whose Chicago office is located in the Heyworth building, 29 E. Madison street, were going to Chicago. They had been in Waukegan, where they demonstrated their diamonds to a jewelry firm, making the trip in a Buick touring car.

COMPLETE COMMUNITY SERVICE DRIVE PLANS

BUDGET SET AT \$12,000

Drive Set for the Week of November 14-19. Work of Past Year a Great Success

Plans for the annual drive for Community Service were completed at a meeting of the Board of Directors held last Monday evening. A careful inspection of the budget needed for the enlarged work planned for next year showed that \$12,000 was needed. The Board therefore set that amount as the goal for the present drive which will be held during the week of Nov. 14 to 19. A generous portion of next year's budget will be set aside for boys' work, as there is a great need for recreation among the younger people. A glance at the report for the year's work shows a splendid record of work done for the community.

There were 104 Educational classes held during the year, attended by a total of nearly 3,000 persons; there were 32 community dances given, attended by a grand total of over 6,000. A number of concerts were held and a most beautiful pageant produced. Athletics and games were organized for the boys, while sings and parties were held for the community at large. A thriving and very successful horse-shoe association was formed and a local as well as a north shore tournament held. Much assistance was given Fort Sheridan and Great Lakes in the entertaining of the soldiers and sailors. Local organizations were given assistance in their work, and many of these organizations are housed in the Community Center.

The Community Center itself, which is maintained by Community Service for the town, has filled a big place in the community life. Here were held numberless committee and organization meetings, parties, dances, bazaars, educational classes, and kindred activities. At the Center are provided magazines, books, and newspapers for reading, writing desks and stationery for writing, general information for the public, and that the Center is used by the town is (Continued on page 14)
