**\$100,000 WORTH OF DIAMONDS TAKEN**

the salesmen, who were unarmed, and forced them into the back seat of the touring car. One of the bandits guarded them, while another drove their car north on Sheridan road. The third followed with the roadster.

East of Ravinia Park the cars were driven through the vacant Higgins property to the bank of the lake. There the salesmen were bound securely with ropes. The hold-up men vanished taking with them the cases of diamonds, which were valued at \$100,000, according to the salesmen's story; \$246 in currency, belonging to the men; and a \$1200 ring from Schwartz.

George Boyer, 1719 Sherman avenue, Evanston, and Louis Shrerer of the same city, who were driving a delivery truck for Marshall Field & Co., saw the trio emerge from the woods. A short time later the diamond salesmen, having released themselves, came to the road. Their machine had been put out of commission by the bandits. The four hastened to a telephone and notified the Highland Park police department. Officer John Sullivan immediately notified the Chicago authorities and a search was immediately instituted for the hold up men.

The gems were contained in a case marked with the initials "M. M. S." According to the salesmen there were about 30 papers of diamonds in it. One cluster alone contained 300 diamonds.

When they were held up, the salesmen, according to their version of the story, resisted the bandits. Schwartz was struck in the face by one of the trio, a man about six feet tall, who weighed about 190 pounds. The other two members of the party were smaller men.

Pinkerton detectives arrived in Ravinia two hours after the robbery, and began their search for the missing treasure.

Meet Every Monday Between 7:40 and 8:40. Plan to Organize Choral Society

A class in Musical Appreciation has been organized in connection with the evening school, meeting on Monday evening from 7:40 to 8:40 at the high school. The object of the course is to enable those taking it to be a good listener - an intelligent listener to music. It is primarily intended for that great majority of people who are frequently, but I know nothing about it.

The course will embrace a little study of music-history, biography, etc., and a study of the various musical forms. The works of various composers from Bach and Haydn on down to the ultra-modern will be heard and discussed, and from time to time players and singers will appear as guests of the class. All those who feel that this course would be of interest are invited to attend. There is no fee.

It is also desired to organize a choral society among the people of Highland Park, and the time set for the rehearsals of that group is from 8:45 to 9:45 Monday evenings, at the high school - immediately following the Music Appreciation class.

The desirability of such a society is evident, but the difficulties of organizing are rather great, owing to the lack of any nucleus. Standard choral works will be taken up, and an appropriate cantata will be presented at the holiday season, if it is possible to organize the Society. Eventually such an organization should develop into an institution whose force will be felt along the whole north shore. All those who are interested are asked to communicate with Mr. Sandwick or his secretary by phone, or come directly to the high school next Monday evening, at 8:45.

Mr. Hubert Conover, the new director of music at the high school, will conduct the class in Music Appreciation, and direct the Choral Society. All alumni of the school are especially asked to assist in organizing these groups.

The work of the last two weeks has been largely preliminary, so that those who start this next week will have missed nothing of the regular course.
