Rev. M. L. Thomas "And these shall go away into everlasting punishment." — Mat. 25:46. Robert McChayens, the great Scotch preacher said that the man who preaches upon this subject ought to do so with tears in his voice. Certainly it is not a pleasant subject to consider, but we cannot always consider those things which are pleasing.

Before we can consider this ultimate place of the ungodly we must first consider the great Judgment.

A Judgment for the world is primarily necessary for two reasons: First, in order to equalize conditions upon the earth. There is no real justice at the present time because there are so many factors which enter into the obtaining of justice. Secondly, a Judgment is necessary in order to fulfill the program of God. It is not reasonable to suppose that the Father will forever allow men to flout His Son Jesus Christ in the face without them being called to an account; it is not reasonable to suppose that God will forever allow Right to be on the gallows and wrong on the throne, some time men must audit their lives and their acts before God.

The Word of God tells us that a day has been set on which he will judge the world by Christ Jesus and after the judgment, what?

The word hell comes from a Greek word meaning Gehenna, or the place where fire is perpetually burning. Even though this be but a symbol, yet all symbols must have some reality back of them. We do not know just what hell is, but it is some place and some condition where God's love and mercy can have no further response in the soul of the being, hell is a place or a condition where men and women have persisted in going over the active protest of God the Father. Let it be definitely understood that God sends no man into this condition of hell, but those who go of their own free will and choice. It is not the Father's will that any should perish, but that all should come to the knowledge of the truth. Many practical theologians feel that one portion of hell will be an awakened conscience and a revived memory. Certainly this was the thought of Dean Stubbs of Ely when he wrote: I sat alone with my conscience In a place where time had ceased, And we talked of our former living In the lands where the years increased

The vision of all my past life Was an awful thing to face— Alone with my conscience sitting of arriving in hell and that is simply

There is one sure and certain way of arriving in hell and that is simply to do nothing, to be totally indifferent to the claims of the Christ upon your life, to drift and to dream will ultimately lead to this condi-

tion. It is not necessary to become a murderer or a debauch to arrive in hell, but scorn the proffered hand of mercy that is placed before us. Just what it means to "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ" we shall never know in this life, but in some way it satisfies God's holy righteousness and love and because of our action, the Father is able to declare us free from sin and condemnation.
