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### TAXI DRIVER SHOT POLICE ARE BAFFLED

#### BLACK HAND SUSPECTED

Body of Pasquale Coscarelli,  
Waukegan Taxi Driver,  
Found Riddled With  
Bullets

The bullet-riddled body of Pasquale Coscarelli, aged 36, found Thursday morning, Nov. 3, at 4 o'clock on the rear porch on the Antonio Spicero home, 409 Market street, Waukegan, where Coscarelli roomed, presents the police of that city with one of the most baffling murder mysteries that have ever confronted them. That Coscarelli was the victim of an Italian secret society is the only solution of the police as robbery was not the motive of the slayer.

Four bullets entered the victim's right side about even with his elbow and plowed their way completely through his body. They lodged just below the skin on the left side, apparently having penetrated his heart.

It is the theory of the police that the assassin fired the shots from a repeating rifle. All the wounds were within a radius of a six inch circle. Robert White, a negro who lives across the street from the Spicero home informed the police Thursday that he heard a shot early in the morning but was afraid to leave the house. Another man told the police he heard but one shot. Despite this fact the police do not take much stock in the theory that the bullets might have been buckshot fired from a shotgun.

Spicero informed the police that he did not hear any shots. He said he heard a sound as if someone had slammed a door, but nothing more. A little later he heard groans on his back porch, he investigated and found Coscarelli lying unconscious in a pool of his own blood. He hurried to a neighbors for assistance but when help came the victim was dead.

Coscarelli had made his home in Waukegan for the last six or seven years and so far as the police have been able to find possessed exemplary habits. For the last few years he had driven a taxicab. He did the most of his work at night. Thursday morning he ate a lunch at the Nolan restaurant and then drove to Spicero's home to go to bed.

That Coscarelli may have received death threats or may have been warned to be on the watch is indicated by the fact that he was placed under

arrest a month ago when he was found on the flats practicing target shooting with a revolver. He had made several of these trips there. It is thought he wanted to perfect himself in the use of the gun so he would be able to defend himself in an emergency. That he was shot down without warning is the belief of the police.

The news of his death is being sent to his widow and three small children in Naples, Italy.

#### RECORDS FOR SMALL CASE IN WAUKEGAN

Filed With Circuit Clerk L. O.  
Brockway at County Seat  
Saturday

The records of the case of Gov. Len Small, Lieut. Gov. Fred Sterling and Vernon Curtis, Grant Park banker, are in Waukegan.

They were filed with Circuit Clerk Lewis O. Brickway, Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

They were taken to Waukegan from Springfield, by Chas. I. Koehn, circuit clerk of Sangamon county, who left the capital Friday at midnight. Clerk Koehn was accompanied to Waukegan by Charles Byers, county clerk of Sangamon county.

Only the original indictment in the case of Gov. Small charging embezzlement was filed. The transcripts, however, included copies of the indictments against Gov. Small, Lieut. Gov. Sterling and Curtis, charging conspiracy and confidence game.

No change of venue has been granted in the case of Sterling and Curtis and both of these are still triable in Sangamon county. Only enough of the cases other than the one against Small were filed to show wherein the records coincide.

The records consist of ten large books made up from the affidavits for change of venue, and the three original indictments against Gov. Small, one being the single one against the governor and the other two including him with Sterling and Curtis.

It is the understanding of Clerk Koehn that only the Small case will go to trial here and that against Curtis will be taken up later.
