DANCES TO ANYTHING THE RECORD PLAYS
Following Clipping from Popular Science Magazine. Mrs. Meehan Local Resident
The latest phonograph novelty is a dancer who illustrates the record as it plays a dance.
About a year ago, Florence Burgess Meehan, of this city, saw the native dances as they were performed for her in the palace of the king of Cambodia. She had many pictures made of these dancers. In Java she found a Malay workman who was able to make reproductions of the dancers.
This model she brought back to America, and worked out a model that could be operated by hand. Then the idea of placing it on a talking machine suggested itself, and now it is possible to witness a Siamese dance while listening to any dance record.
A jointed lever connects the small wire passing through the head with a wheel that touches the record. As the record turns, the lever moves. Another notched wheel connects with another lever connected with the body. This makes the figure dance.

COMMUNITY SERVICE IN CHARGE OF EMPLOYMENT
Work Turned Over to Community Center. Employees or Employers Call There.
As another step towards centralizing all community activities in Community Service and acting as a clearing house for these activities the city authorities have asked Community Service of Highland Park to take over the employment bureau work recently organized under the direction of the local city commission.
Community Service has been doing this work for some time and it was thought wise to centralize all efforts along this line in one place.
There is more unemployment in Highland Park than the casual observer would think and everyone must do his bit to help alleviate the situation as it will get worse rather than better as the cold weather sets in.
At the present time Community Service has on file applications for work from chauffeurs, gardeners, butlers, bookkeepers and clerical men and part time jobs for students. There are also a number of applications for common labor or any kind of work at all and those needing help can secure immediate service by getting in touch with Mr. Herring at the Community Center.
During the past week Community Service has placed a half dozen people in positions where they can earn a living.

EDWARDS RECALLS GRAND JURY, NOV. 16
Will Hear Evidence in the Case of Man Charged With Murder
Judge Clair C. Edwards late Tuesday afternoon ordered that the October grand jury be recalled for 10 o'clock a. m., Nov. 16, granting the request of State's Attorney A. V. Smith.
The prosecutor made the request in order to investigate the case of George Niggemeyer, Fox Lake resident, held without bond in the county jail, on a murder charge.
Niggemeyer, is charged with having shot and killed John L. Johnson, Chicago hardware merchant at Fox Lake several weeks ago, after a dispute over possession of a mud hen.
