"Dowie a Foremost American"
Says Voliva; Other Items
of Happenings in
This Vicinity

Judge E. D. Shurtleff will hold circuit court in Waukegan, to assist Judge Claire C. Edwards is taking care of the regular business of that court while the latter is presiding at the trial of Governor Small.

Under the heading, "Americanism" Wilbur Glean Voliva is announcing through the medium of a bulletin board erected on Sheridan road, Zion, that John Alexander Dowie was one of the foremost American citizens in his day. Independents attacked this stand, and in reply Voliva printed on his board a quotation from the remarks by Judge E. Gary of the superior court, made at the time of the naturalization of Dowie. Judge Gary said, according to Voliva, "In the naturalization of John Alexander Dowie, I desire to say that no more important and honorable acquisition has been made to the citizenship of the United States of America since the days of the Revolution.

Archie Schwartztrauber of Zion, has been named winner of the prize for the best essay written by a city boy who attend the Boy's State Fair at Springfield this fall. As a prize he will receive a gold medal and \$10 in gold, to be presented by Francis G. Blair, state superintendent of public instruction at the opening of the State Fair school next fall.

Village President Miller of Winnetka has issued a proclamation requiring all dogs in that village to be muzzled. This action followed the report that a man had been bitten by a rabies-infected stray dog. The canine was shot by the police, but village authorities feared that it may have transmitted the disease to other dogs.

Thrown thirty feet from his automobile when it was struck by an engine on the E. J. & E. railroad at a crossing three miles northeast of Barrington, William Sandman, a Lake Zurich farmer, escaped with a broken leg and minor injuries. The automobile was badly smashed.

An anonymous gift of \$50,000 has been made to the protective endow-

ment of the Northwestern University College of Engineering. This makes a total of \$150,000 that has been added to the endowment of that department within the last eighteen months.

INSTALLED DEC. 1

Educational Conference Will Accompany Inauguration Exercises at Champaign

Urbana, Ill. — The installation of Dr. David Kinley as President of the University of Illinois will take place on Thursday, December 1, it was announced this week.

The installation exercises will occur at one of the sessions of the great educational conference which will be held at the University on December 1 and 2. The general topic for the conference has been announced as "The relation of the Federal government to education."

The installation exercises will occur at the evening session of the first day of the conference. Dr. Kinley will deliver the installation address. He will speak on the "Relation of State and Nation in Educational Policy."

Dr. Kinley has been a faculty member of the University of Illinois for more than twenty-eight years. He has been head of the institution since June-1919. At that time he was requested by the Board of Trustees to fill the unexpired term of Dr. Edmund J. James who suffered a collapse because of ill health. Dr. Kinley served as Acting President until June 1920, when he accepted the presidency for the unexpired term of Dr. James. In March 1921, he was elected to the presidency for another term of two years.

Dr. Kinley had also served as Vice-President of the University from 1914 up to the time he became Acting President.
