Funeral Held Monday Morning at Ebenezer Church, Rev. Milton Geil Officiating
Emma Dietrich Hintz was born in Bastein, Kreisgericht, Mebrichstadt, Bavaria, Germany, January 8, 1855, and died Nov. 11, 1921.

The Ebenezer Evangelical church of Highland Park sustains a distinct loss in the death of Mrs. Hintz. She was one of the charter members of the church, laboring incessantly for its uplift and fruitfulness.

Her character was of that sterling quality, made so by her every thought for others and her wondrous patience in suffering. Her death marked a life of triumphant victory.

The funeral services were held on Monday, November 14, from the Ebenezer Evangelical church at Highland Park, conducted by the pastor, the Rev. M. G. Geil. A former pastor, the Rev. Umbach, of Evanston, sang two beautiful selections.
