**PUBLIC LIBRARY**

The opening night of the Children's Book Week, Monday, found about one hundred and fifty people assembled in Library Hall to hear Mr. Edward Yeomans. The speaker struck the keynote of his address in his first few sentences, when he said that "he personally felt the deepest sense of responsibility toward his children when he tried to so shape their training for life that they might amid the present confused mass of our civilization be able in a sense to get on with it and yet not be overwhelmed with its demands."

His talk while utterly devoid of formality, was so awakening that groups of people lingered long after the close of the address to question and discuss its topics. Three books especially mentioned by Mr. Yeomans were, "The Wind in the Willows," by Kenneth Grahame, a book which children may read and re-read with constant joy; "The Art of Living," by Quiller-Couch, in which he referred especially to the three chapters on Bible reading; and a volume by Romaine Rolland entitled "Clerambault," which he said was like unto the rollicking humor of the middle-ages. The first of these is in the library collection and the others will be secured at once.

The Wednesday afternoon entertainment for the children was well attended. Miss Elizabeth Gordon (Mrs. George Edwin Canfield) in a pleasant, well-modulated voice, gave the children sprightly introductions to her book characters. Little Lorraine and her fairy friends of Sunbeam and Frost and Fire became real as their author told about them, to say nothing of "Molly and Dolly."

Thursday afternoon the children will have a further treat in the tales of Lady Teddy and Down Spider Web Lane by Mrs. William Donahey, who will also talk of the Tinnie Weenies.


Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock there mothers, sisters, aunts and cousins, who are interested in what book to give the little ones and the big ones. At this time Mrs. Dean Wiegand Taylor will discuss "Children's Books and Reading." Before her marriage Mrs. Taylor was a trained librarian for children especially, and she has had much experience in dealing with children plus books. She can tell you probable results of certain combinations, and speak with authority of the kind of books for each age of child-life. At the close of the talk little booklets giving a list of 100 good books for children's Christmas presents will be distributed.

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
