## DEERFIELD ELEVEN OFF FOR BROCKTON

LEFT MONDAY EVENING

Mass Meeting Held in Honor of Team. 1000 Citizens and Students See Them Off For East

The present season has seen the West triumphant over the East in every inter-sectional contest of note and it is with high hope that the local squad lines up on Keith Memorial field at Brockton, Thanksgiving Day, determined to further emphasize that supremacy.

The Deerfield-Shields combination has gone through the season unbeaten and since the New England team has but one defeat to mar an otherwise perfect record, a tough scrap is to be expected.

The game will be played on the new field presented to the city of Brockton by Mr. George E. Keith, founder of the Walk-Over shoe business, in memory of his son, who died in London, England, during the war while in the service of the United States government. Interest in the holiday contest is running high in the eastern city. Brockton high having lost but one game and that to the strong Haverhill team, which played Jacksonville, Florida, last season. This Thanksgiving day game with a team of such caliber as Deerfield-Shields, coming from such a distance is a distinct departure in Brockton athletics.

## DRIVE HAS REACHED ITS HALF WAY MARK

\$5500 ALREADY RECEIVED

Final Meeting of Community Service Campaigners to be Held Next Monday Evening

The Community Service drive committee met at the Community Center last Monday evening to review the results attained in the first week's effort to raise the budget for 1922.

Mrs. E. J. Grundy, treasurer, reported a total of \$5500 received in cash and pledges, which is about half the amount needed for the full year's work. It was reported that the business men's committee had not completed their drive, and several workers had not yet seen all the prospects that had been assigned to them. An encouraging feature of the reports was that the number of turn-downs had not exceeded 5%.

The balance of prospect cards still in the drive files were given out to the workers and one more week of intensive work will be done before a final report is handed in. A final meeting of the workers will be held at the Community Center next Monday evening at 8:00 p. m. at which all final returns will be tabulated.

Citizens of the community are requested to send their subscriptions in to the Community Center without waiting for a formal call from workers. Subscriptions of any amount will be gratefully received. This is the last week of the drive and much depends upon the results attained this week.

## DEERFIELD WINS HOME-COMING GAME AND THE CHAMPIONSHIP

THOUSANDS SEE LOCALS TROUNCE OAK PARK 14-0

Snowstorm Friday Night Failed to Spoil Saturday's Contest for Suburban League Pennant; Muddy Field Forces Both Teams to Play Careful Ball; Visitors' Forward Passes Fail

Playing a driving, decisive game, Coach Rothacher's fighting eleven defeated Oak Park 14 to 0 last Saturday on the local field and won the undisputed championship of the Suburban League. The game was tory was a great treat for the many played before a crowd of nearly four thousand people. The splendid vic-alumni who were on hand for the annual homecoming celebration.

The game opened with Deerfield plainly the aggressor; the first score coming in the first five minutes of play. The ball was advanced by steady work down to the one yard line, and Quarterback McBride plunged over for the first tally. Baldwin kicked goal. For the time Oak Park did not seem to weaken materially in spite of this score. In the second quarter Coach Thistlewaite's men did their best work. Deerfield's regular right end was taken from the game because of injuries. The ball was brought down into Deerfield's territory almost to the twenty yard line. Coach Rothacher's men stiffened, and Oak Park fumbled. Sandwick squirmed through and fell on the ball. The balance of the period it was Deerfield's game.

The second half opened with the local eleven much the stronger. Coach Thistlewaite resorted to numerous substitutions in an effort to stem the tide. Again Deerfield marched the ball down the field and by aid of a penalty and the only forward pass the local boys tried, McBride to Sandwick, placed the ball on the one yard line. After failing to score on two plays, the oval was finally carried over for the second time by the Deerfield quarter. Baldwin again kicked goal. The ball had hardly been put in play before the home team was tearing into the visitors again. By aid of another penalty, Deerfield was on Oak Park's one yard line. The remarkable strength of Oak Park's heavier line was displayed at this time, for they held and gaining possession of the ball punted immediately to safety. The astute Oak Park center tried all his tricks to score in the final period. New men easily distinguishable because of their clean jerseys were sent in to receive the rain of forward passes which the visitors began. Only one of these gained any ground. The game ended with Oak Park vainly attempting to score via the aerial route.

The style of football used by the coaches was materially influenced by the condition of the field—a sea of (Continued on Page 12)
