POISON WHISKEY IS PEDDLED IN COUNTY

Still; May be Located Near County Line

Search for a "poison whiskey" still, the product of which will kill many persons unless it is confiscated immediately was begun last week by State's Attorney A. V. Smith.

Analysis of a sample from this still by Coroner Peter Hoffman showed that it contains a large percentage of formaldehyde, a deadly poison used in embalming. It came from a still said to be located in Lake county, and has been peddled in Cook county at \$12 a gallon.

"Several deaths are bound to occur unless this still is immediately confiscated," the coroner said, after receiving Chemist McNally's report. "I am going to do everything in my power to find it. I understand that the owner of the still has several customers in Chicago."

"The sample was handed to me a few days ago by a well-known business man. He said the price was \$12 a gallon and that it tasted like good whiskey."

It is the belief of the prosecutor that this still is located in the southern part of the county, near the Cook county line.

WILLIAM SPELLMAN, PIONEER, IS DEAD

Born in Libertyville in 1847; Lived in Lake County All His Life

William Spellman, pioneer resident of Lake county, 74 years old, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Henry Kristian, North Chicago, Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 16, at 4 o'clock, following an illness of a year.

Mr. Spellman was born on a farm at Libertyville, in 1847, and had been a resident of Lake county all his life, being well known in the entire county.

He is survived by four daughters and four sons as follows: Mrs. Henry Sheridan, William, Robert and Daniel Spellman, Mrs. John E. Reardon, of Waukegan; Mrs. Kristian, North Chicago, and Mrs. Harry Mulholland, of Museda, Wis., and four brothers and one sister, Timothy, of Nekeosa, Wis.; Patrick, of Evanston, Ill.; Thomas of Chicago; Peter Spellman and Mrs. Margaret Yager, of Waukegan.
