MANY READ "EXTRA" AFTER GAME SATURDAY

Special Edition of Highland
Park Press Issued 10 Min-
utes After the Contest

Ten minutes after the final whistle was blown in the big Home-Coming game at the high school, Saturday afternoon an extra edition of the Highland Park Press was on the street telling the story of the game. As Oak Park's special trains pulled out of Highland Park, youngsters distributed among the visitors the papers which told of their team's defeat.

During the contest, which was to settle the championship of the Suburban league, the news of the game was relayed to the Press office by quaters. When it was over, the final "slugs" were placed in the form, and the press was started. Boys distributed several hundred copies at the high school and in the business district. They were quickly gobbled up.

The special edition, in addition to the story of the game, carried an account of the other Home-coming features at the high school, and published in full the text of Principal R. L. Sandwick's address, made at the dedication of the Memorial Tablet. The complete program for the day was outlined.

The circulation of an "extra" is a new departure in the annals of north shore newspaperdom. Few weekly plans have the organization necessary to turn out an issue on such short notice.
