Mrs. Frederick A. Preston Submits Report of Work of Woman's Organization

 The Woman's Auxiliary of the Highland Park Hospital was organized in December 1920, with the following officers:

The object of the Auxiliary is to support a free bed for maternity cases. Six hundred dollars a year, to be paid to the Hospital in monthly installments of fifty dollars, has been pledged for this purpose. From January 1921, to October 1921, six babies have been delivered and an average of twelve days hospital care given to each mother.

The Auxiliary has also included in its activities the former "Home Equipment Committee" and at monthly sewing meetings held in the Presbyterian Church has provided new supplies as Miss Williams has needed them. Three meetings were held in the church and two special meetings were held at the homes of Mrs. Marshall E. Sampson and Mrs. Fred A. Preston.

 18 pillow cases
 2 dozen basket pads
 16 diapers

In February, the Auxiliary gave a bridge party at the Community Center and \$386.00 was raised. This was sent to the treasurer of the Hospital, to be spent in equipment for the new maternity wing of the hospital.

In May, a tea was given at the Nurses' Home that the members of the Auxiliary might meet Miss Williams and the nursing staff, and those who had not already done so, inspect the hospital.

The annual membership dues in the Auxiliary are \$10.00 a year for regular membership and \$5.00 a year for associate-membership.

The membership committee now reports 66 regular and 24 associate members.

Since January 1921, \$500.00 has been paid to the hospital and the treasury holds \$180.00.

**ATTORNEYS ARGUE OVER
 BOOZE STOREHOUSE**

Field Claims That Liquor is Poorly Guarded, and May be Tampered With

That the storehouse where States Attorney Smith keeps confiscated booze could be tampered with, and that there is no assurance that the liquor is not tampered with between the time it is placed there after raids, and the time it is removed to be used as evidence, was the contention in county court last week when Atty. George Field in the case of Fred Born Fox Lake hotel keeper on trial on a charge of having violated the prohibitory law.

Members of States Atty. Smith's raiding crew testified to having raided Born's place on October 12 of this year at which time they said they obtained a large quantity of bottled whiskey.

Delbert Weale, one of the witnesses, testified that he sampled a number of these bottles and said they contained intoxicating liquor.

Mr. Field made a motion that the exhibits be ruled out on the ground that there was no assurance that there might not be extra keys for the large barn on North County street where the booze is stored. Constable Brune testified that so far as he knew he had all the keys to the place but admitted it was possible there were others which he did not know about. Judge Persons seemed inclined to grant Mr. Field's motion.

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
