MERRY CHRISTMAS FOR CHICAGO "KIDS"

Red, White, and Blue Club Will Play Santa to 400,000 This Year

Every child in Chicago will have a merry Christmas this year, according to plans under way, directed by Mrs. Jos. G. Coleman and the coterie of Chicago society women who make possible the Red, White and Blue club, a neighborhood home for the children of the streets and a nucleus of Americanization. Mrs. Coleman and her aids will play Santa Claus again this year to 400,000 school children of the public and parochial schools who will be given free tickets to the Christmas Tree festival and Toyland circus, to be held at the Coliseum December 14 to 23 for the benefit of the Red, White and Blue club.

Every child will be given an opportunity to see a real Santa Claus come out of a real chimney, a sixty foot brilliantly illuminated Christmas tree, and will receive a free gift. They also will see the Toyland Circus, with clowns and acrobats and a menagerie and can ride the ponies, the merry-go-rounds, ferris wheel and eat candy, peanuts, red hot, lollypops and drink pink lemonade to their hearts' content. There will be plenty of music. The school bands will play afternoons and evenings, and there will be something doing all the time for the entertainment of the children.

Mrs. Coleman, who is chairman of the directorate of the Red, White and Blue club, is general chairman of the Christmas Tree festival; Mrs. Frank Crawford Lettis is vice-chairman. The other members of the general festival committee are: Mrs. Edward S. Beck, Mrs. Orville E. Babcock, Mrs. Edward R. Fifield, Mrs. Charles E. Frankenthal, Miss Helen Gilbert, Mrs. Howard Gillette, Mrs. Morris L. Johnston, Miss Caroline Kirkland, Miss Muriel McCormick, Mrs. Robert G. McGann, Mrs. Julien Mason, Mrs. Wm. R. Mrs. Coleman has appointed the following as her assistants on the various committees: Toy, Mrs. Arthur Cable, chairman, Miss Muriel McCormick; Tickets, Mrs. Edward S. Beck, chairman, Mrs. Morris Johnston, Miss Helen Gilbert; Greens, Mrs. Edward R. Fifield, chairman; tree trimmings, Mrs. Kay Wood, chairman, Mrs. Wm. R. Odell.

The Red, White and Blue club is located at 1001 Courier street. There little near-waifs find joy and comfort in its shelter and relief from the cold. The members range from one to fifteen years and come from families of Russians, Poles, Hungarians, Bohemians and others of foreign birth. The club has a circulating library, a piano, sewing machine, a pool table and many games. The enthusiastic Americanism and good citizenship this club has taught is marvelous, and each year, through the Christmas Tree festival and Toyland Circus at the Coliseum, these women are enabled to carry on this work. It is their aim to make the festival this year the greatest that has ever been held.

LICENSE PLATES FOR NEXT YEAR ARE READY

1922 Motor Vehicle Numbers
Black on Pearl Gray
Background

Springfield.—The first shipment of the 1922 automobile license plates have been received from the manufacturers by Secretary of State L. L. Emmerson and he announced today that he is all set for the new season. Thousands of applications will be received after December 1, the first day for sending them in.

The license plates next year will show a marked difference from the plates issued by the Secretary of State heretofore. There will be a hyphen between the last three figures in the number and the first figures, thus 155-567. The license plate, by provision of an act passed by the last general assembly, will be one inch narrower. The new plates will have a pearl-gray background and the numerals will make the plates easier to be read.

More than 600,000 pairs of plates were used this year, and it is estimated that at least 700,000 pairs of plates will be used in 1922. There will be a saving of approximately \$100,000 on the cost of plates this year, in addition to the saving on size, due to the decrease in the cost of materials and manufacture.
