**NEW TRANSMISSION LINE PUT IN USE**

Public Service Co. Now Has Duplicate Lines From Evanston to Waukegan

Tuesday, Nov. 1, the new duplicate transmission line between Highland Park and Lake Bluff sub station was put into use by the Public Service company. The line is of standard class "A" three phase construction, with No. 2/0 copper wire on 35-foot wood poles equipped with overhead group wire for lightning protection. This section of line completes a duplicate of transmission lines from Evanston to Waukegan.

Miss Muriel Valentine of Soissons, will speak at the Elm Place school Monday evening on "The Reconstruction Work of the American Committee in Devastated France." Mrs. Rob-

Miss Valentine has worked in France for over three years and has been decorated with the Croix de guerre.
