SPEEDERS FLEE AFTER KILLING PEDESTRIAN

POLICEMEN GIVE CHASE

Peter Novakovich of North Chicago Instantly Killed When Touring Car Strikes Him

A "vampire" auto, speeding sixty miles an hour, instantly killed Peter Novakovich, aged 53, Seventeenth and State Streets, North Chicago, Saturday night about five o'clock and then disappeared in the semi-darkness after the driver discovered he had slain a man. Motorcycle policemen pursued the machine toward Chicago but gave up when they lost the trail. The tragedy occurred on Waukegan road, opposite the naval station. The Chicago and Evanston police were notified but from the meager description given were unable to find any trace of the car.

Novakovich and a friend who are employed as gardeners on the Arcady farm at Lake Forest, were walking to their homes in North Chicago when the former met death. They were walking on the side of the road, well off the pavement. The vampire car, it is stated approached from the north at terrific speed and at the moment Novakovich was killed the left front wheel was five feet off the pavement on the left side of the street.

The machine is described as a large, gray touring car, probably a Stutz or a Cadillac. The left headlight was smashed by the impact which hurled Novakovich, crushed and bleeding further to the side of the road. A subsequent examination showed the victim had suffered a fracture of the skull and left leg. Death was almost instantaneous.

The touring car came to a stop some distance down the road and one of the four occupants hurried back where the dead man lay beside the roadway.

"You'd better get an ambulance and have him taken to the hospital," he told Novakovich's companion.

"What's your name," the latter demanded.

"Never mind," was the reply as the man hurried back to the car which at once speeded up and disappeared down the road.

A little later Frank Gaballa of North Chicago, former speed cop there, but of late fling this position at Deerfield, arrived on the scene. He said he had met the gray touring car three miles down the road. The car, he said, was being driven at a terrific rate of speed.

As soon as he learned what had happened he turned his machine around and tore back to Deerfield where he notified the county speed officer and the chase of the vampire car was resumed. The policemen finally lost the trail and the fugitives escaped.

Meanwhile the Waukegan police had received a report of the tragedy and had called up the police of Evanston and Chicago, asking them to be on the watch for the machine.

The remains of Novakovich were removed to the Joseph Petrosius undertaking rooms where the inquest was held.

White Gifts for the King Service to be Given, Sunday Afternoon, Dec. 18
