### ROAD IMPROVEMENT BONDS ADVERTISED

the center of Section 23; thence north to the north ¼ corner of Section 23; thence northwest to State Aid Route No. 9, in the northwest ¼ of Section 15; thence northeasterly on said route No. 9 to the Village of Wauconda; to be improved with a graded roadway 30 feet wide to the center of Section 23 and from thence to Wauconda for a width of 28 feet, a total distance of 7 miles at an estimated cost of \$27,000.00.

Wauconda-Volo road, beginning at an intersection with State Aid Route No. 9, in the Village of Wauconda; thence northerly a distance of 5¼ miles to an intersection with Route No. 7, in Volo, to be improved with a graded way 30 feet wide and with an 18 foot concrete pavement, at an estimated cost of \$150,000.00.

Grand avenue, beginning at the present end of the concrete road, at the east line of the Village of Lake Villa, thence west to State Aid Route No. 1; and also, said Aid Route, No. 1, beginning at State Aid Route No. 6, thence northerly a distance of 5-8 miles to Channel Lake Road, (previously designated State Aid Route No. 1-A) in the Village of Antioch; to be improved with a graded way 30 feet wide and with an 18 foot concrete road, at an estimated cost of \$165,000.00.

Grand Avenue from the Village of Lake Villa west to the Fox Lake-Antioch Road, a distance of 1½ miles to be improved with a graded way 30 feet wide at an estimated cost of \$8,000.00.

Hainesville-Long Lake Road, beginning of State Aid Road No. 7, in Hainesville, running northwesterly and north through Round Lake to be improved with a graded way 30 feet wide; and that part of road from Hainesville to the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul tracks in the Village of Round Lake, to be improved with an 18 foot concrete pavement and from thence to the terminus to be im-

proved with a 16 foot wide concrete road a distance of 3 miles at an estimated cost of \$80,000.00.

Lakes Road from Volo northerly a distance of 5 miles to be improved by a graded roadway 28 feet in width at an estimated cost of \$35,000.

Total estimated cost of the foregoing improvements is \$1,000,000.00.

In order to provide for the payment of the principal and interest of said bonds, it will be necessary to levy taxes in excess of the sum of fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of the valuation and such additional tax will amount to thirty cents upon each one hundred dollars of the valuation. The question of levying said additional tax of thirty cents on each one hundred dollars of the valuation during each of years 1919 to 1938 both inclusive was submitted the voters in 1919 and carried by a large majority.

### LICENSES REQUIRED FOR ENTERTAINMENTS

full names and residences of the principal officers of such, and a description of the place where it is proposed to conduct a place of public amusement as defined in this ordinance, and a description of the kind and class of entertainment the applicant proposes to give, and the seating capacity of such place. Upon any such application being made the City Marshal of the City of Highland Park shall make or cause to be made an investigation of such applicant, and if as a result of such investigation the City Marshal finds that the applicant is of good moral character and a proper and suitable person to be so licensed and that a place for which such application for a license has been filed is a suitable and sanitary place under the ordinances of the City to be so licensed, he shall recommend the issuance of a license, and the Mayor upon the recommendation of the City Marshal, shall, in his discretion he deems it advisable, issue or cause to be issued to such applicant a license, attested by the City Clerk, which shall entitle the licensee to conduct, produce, present, operate, or offer the kind of enter-

tainment specified in such license at the place designated in such application, and for the period of time specified in such license upon the payment of the license fee hereinafter provided; provided, however, where all the proceeds of any games or exhibitions, or of any dance or skating held in such place inure exclusively to the use or benefit of charitable, religious, or educational institutions, and where proof to such effect is furnished in a manner satisfactory to the Mayor, the license fee for any such entertainment shall be one dollar for each day.

SECTION IV. If the place at which it is desired to conduct, produce, present, operate or offer any of the amusements or exhibitions authorized by the ordinance be not a fit or proper place, and not constructed, maintained, operated or conducted in accordance with the provisions of the ordinance of the city governing and controlling said places, or if the amusement or entertainment desired to be produced or offered be of an immoral or dangerous character, or if the person making application for a license be not of a good moral character, the Mayor may refuse to approve such application and no license shall be issued by the City Clerk except upon the approval of the Mayor.

SECTION V. That the fee to be charged for a license to produce, present, conduct, operate or offer any of the foregoing specified amusements shall be twenty-five dollars for each day.

SECTION VI. If any person, firm, club, or corporation shall desire to produce, present, conduct, operate, or offer any of the foregoing specified amusements more frequently than one day in each month, such person, firm, club, or corporation shall so state in his or its application for a license, and thereafter, during said month, such license may issue without the investigation of the City Marshal, as hereinabove provided.

SECTION VII. Any person or persons, society, club, firm or corporation that shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than ten or more than two hundred dollars for each offense, and each day such violation continues shall be regarded as a separate offense. The Mayor is hereby authorized, in case any person or persons, society, club, firm, or corporation shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or any of the general ordinances of the City of Highland Park or laws of the State of Illinois, upon the request of the City Council to revoke any such license issued to any such person or persons, society, club, firm or corporation under and by virtue of the terms of this ordinance.

SECTION VIII. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.
