OIL WELLS INTEREST LAKE COUNTY PEOPLE MAY HAVE SUPPLY HERE

Residents of Lake county are much interested in the statement that oil wells are to be sunk in both McHenry and Boone counties, for it is felt here that if there is oil in the sister counties the probabilities are very strong that there is oil here also.

So far as that is concerned there have been efforts from time to time to obtain oil in Lake county but no gushers ever have been located. It was only a few years ago that an effort was made to sink an artesian well in the vicinity of Round-out. After the work had progressing for a time the drilling had to be stopped for it was found that oil was oozing up out of the bore. The well was abandoned because the man who was drilling it was disgusted over not striking good water and did not pay any attention to the possibilities of an oil well. Belief prevails now that had the drilling proceeded farther that oil might have been found in paying quantities.

It is probable that as a result of the activities in the nearby counties that there will be considerable prospecting in Lake county. Fain Karin, of Waukegan, was captured Saturday night after breaking away from House Detective Robert Fitzgerald, of Carson, Pirie and Scott and Company, and shooting the officer from whom he had escaped.

Miss Hart contested the will on the ground that undue influence was brought to bear upon her aunt.

"BLUE SKY" LAW IS HELD CONSTITUTIONAL

SUPREME COURT DECIDES

\$100,000,000 Fraudulent Securities Kept Out by This Act Says Secretary of State, Emmerson

Springfield, Ill.—The State Supreme Court has conclusively upheld the constitutionality of the Illinois Securities or "blue sky" law, enacted in 1919. The decision was rendered in the case of Ben A. Stewart against David Brady, appealed from the Rock Island circuit court. At the June term the court held the law constitutional in this case, in an opinion written by Justice Carter, but a rehearing was granted and it was on the rehearing that the final decision was made.

Secretary of State Louis L. Emmerson, under whose administration this law was prepared and passed by the legislature, expressed himself as well pleased with the final establishment of its validity. He pointed out that under the provisions of the act more than \$100,000,000 of fraudulent securities has been excluded during the past two years and many millions more have been discouraged from coming into the state because of the evident impossibility of securing permission to sell.

The purpose of the act, according to Justice Dunn, who wrote the opinion of the court on the rehearing, "is not only to furnish information to protect credulity and ignorance from deception and imposition and prevent fraudulent and deceitful sales of securities as because of their character, place and manner of their sale, or the character of the seller are not subject to such a degree as in the judgment of the legislature required legislation to protect the purchasers."

"Nonresident vendors and sleek parapatetic salesmen with glib tongues and indurated consciences, of stock and other securities for the purpose of developing wildcat oil fields in distant states, mythical rubber plantations in Guatemala and imaginary copper mines in Mexico, and electric current from sea water and light from cucumbers and power from the rise and fall of the tides and for the hundreds of other visionary schemes, domestic and foreign, designed to secure a great return from a small investment in a short time, fall within the terms of the act. No one will question its application to such cases, even though many of the enterprises may prove successful eventually, because many people have been cheated and deceived by the statements made in such cases and have unfortunately invested their money in worthless securities and are without remedy."

The court reviewed the provisions of the act and concluded that the legislature had power to provide for the classification of securities as it has. "While the privilege of engaging in lawful business is the right of every individual," the opinion says, "it is subject to the police power and must be exercised in accordance with the requirements of the statutes passed in the exercise of that power for the protection of the public."

The court pointed out that similar acts have been adopted by about forty states and that practically all of the objections made to this law have been decided adversely to the contention of the appellants by the Supreme Court of the United States.

"The extent of the penalty for dealing in securities contrary to the requirements of the statutes," the court concludes, "was a matter for the legislature to determine, and the declaring of all contracts made in violation of the statutes void and the authorizing the recovery of the purchase money together with reasonable attorney's fees, was within the power."

Numerous suits and prosecutions pending in various courts have been awaiting the final decision on the constitutionality of the act. Prosecuting officers will now prosecute these cases.
