

HELD CONSTITUTIONAL

SUPREME COURT DECIDES

\$100,000,000 Fraudulent Securities Kept Out by This Act Says Secretary of State, Emmerson

Springfield, Ill .- The State Supreme Court has conclusively upheld the constitutionality of the Illinois Securities or "blue sky" law, enacted in 1919. The decision was rendered in the case of Ben A. Stewart against David Brady, appealed from the Rock Island circuit court. At the June term the court held the law constitutional in this case, in an opinion written by Justice Carter, but a rehearing was granted and it was on the rehearing that the final decision was made,

Secretary of State Louis L. Emmerson, under whose administration this law was prepared and passed by the legislature, expressed himself as well pleased with the final establishment of its validity. He pointed out that under the provisions of the act more than \$100,000,000 of fraudulant securities has been excluded during the past two years and many millions more have been discouraged from coming into the state because of the evident impossibility of securing permission to sell. "While the privilege of engaging in lawful business is the right of every individual," the opinion says, "it is subject to the police power and must be exercised in accordance with the requirements of the statutes passed in the exercise of that power for the protection of the public.
