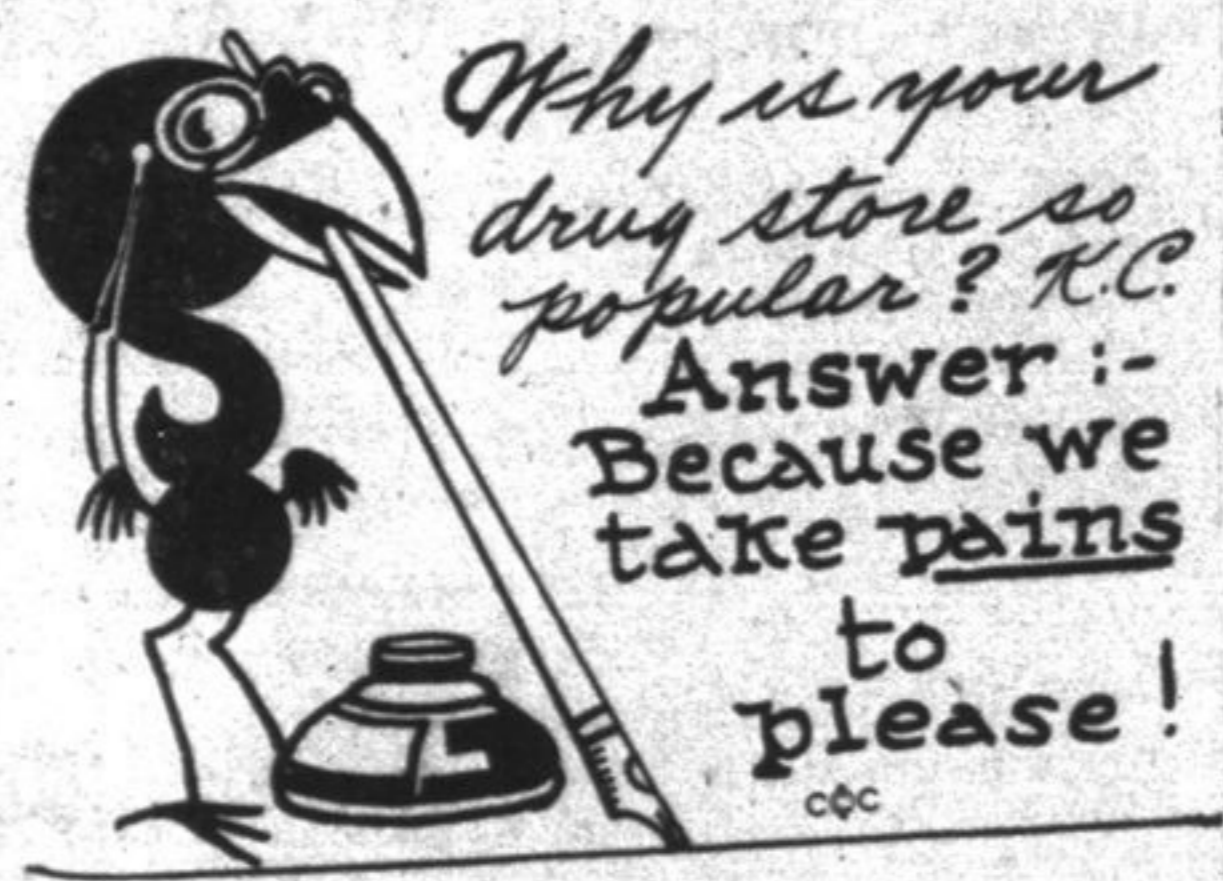

BANDITS GET MUCH LIQUOR AT GLENCOE

Raid Millionaires Wine Vaults and Escape; Guards and Servants Overpowered

Deputy sheriffs guarded every Lake county highway last Friday in an effort to apprehend a quartet of armed bandits who Friday morning broke into the home of Charles A. Stonehill, at Glencoe, overpowered servants, and stole \$100,000 worth of rare wines and liquors.

It is believed that the bandits fled in the direction of Waukegan after the robbery.

Only the servants and armed guards watching the liquor vaults were at the home when the bandits entered. Stonehill, a multi-millionaire, wholesale milliner, is traveling to the south with his family.

powered and locked up in another part of the house, while the bandits carried on their work.

The liquor vaults were stripped of hundreds of cases of rare wines and whiskies, said to have been gathered by Stonehill over a long period of years.

The bandits worked methodically and, apparently with little fear of interruption. Their methods indicated a thorough familiarity with the house and its contents.

Escape With Moving Van One of the servants finally succeeded in breaking away from the house, and reported the robbery to police by the servants, the robbers, were sent out in several directions in search of the gang.

According to the stories told to police by the servants, the robbers, after looting the house, hauled the liquor away in a large moving van.

The Stonehill home was raided by bandits in 1901, while the family was away.
