Jan. 4th.—Visited Red Cross Canteen at the Washburne Continuation School. A lunch of pork roast, hominy cooked in gravy, potatoes, bread and butter is furnished for ten cents to the 350 ex-service men who are taking vocational training. Handicapped by loss of health or loss of a limb, they are cheerfully learning new trades.

Jan. 5th.—A 21-year-old ex-service man, unable to work more than half the time, as a result of injuries received in service, came here for the first time today. He was ragged and hungry and worried to the point of insanity. His wife is about to be confined and he has not made enough for living expenses. Fed him, clothed him, called on his wife, cared for immediate needs and arranged for her care at a lying-in hospital. Will help him in the filing of his claim for compensation.

Jan. 6th.—Mr. B. came up to report that his compensation has come through and arrangements are to be made for his vocational training.

Jan. 7th.—Wrote letters of thanks to the Junior Red Cross auxiliaries for Christmas presents they provided for 350 ex-service men and over 500 children who otherwise would not have had any Christmas.
