EICHLER COMMUNITY SERVICE PRESIDENT ELECTION HELD MONDAY

\$1,500 in Bonds Have Already Been Retired, According to Report of Building Committee

The annual meeting of the Community Service of Highland Park, (Inc.) was held at the Community Center Monday evening. The following directors were elected to fill vacancies: Mrs. E. A. Bourneque, Mrs. E. J. Grundy, Mrs. A. R. Jones, Mrs. H. B. Roberts, Mrs. E. W. Spencer, Mrs. Harry Luther, Harry E. Eichler, Edw. Hoskins, Albert Larson, Harry Parkin, Harry Paul, S. A. St. Peter, Jesse L. Smith, Egbert Spencer, and John L. Udell.

Harry E. Eichler was elected president for the ensuing year, Albert Larson, vice-president, and Mrs. H. B. Roberts, secretary. Mrs. E. J. Grundy was re-elected treasurer. The treasurer's annual report was read and accepted.

The building committee announces that in addition to paying 6 per cent interest on the Community Service bonds, that \$1,500.00 worth of the bonds have been retired already. The Service went through last year without a deficit and it is the intention of the finance committee to make the same record this year. A careful budget of expense has been drawn up by a budget committee and will be rigidly adhered to.

The treasurer's report for the past year will be printed in next week's issue of the Press.

FIRE DEPARTMENT ANSWERS THREE CALLS

Dr. Davis' Garage, Deerfield, Completely Destroyed Sun. \$700 Damage to House

The local fire department responded to three calls on Sunday and Monday, two of these being out of town calls.

Sunday morning Dr. C. J. Davis' garage in Deerfield was completely destroyed by fire. Dr. Davis discovered the fire in time to save his two automobiles which were in the garage. Considerable headway had been gained by the blaze before the department was called, and the high wind fanned the blaze endangering nearby houses.

A leaky gas pipe in the basement of the Swedish Lutheran church, Highwood, threatened the church with fire Sunday morning. No damage was done.

The August Benson house on Bloom St., caught fire Monday morning from a short circuit of defective electric wiring. The damage amounted to \$700. The house was occupied by Frank Carlson and Fred Anderson.

Bingham appeared on the first lyceum course of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber company, at Akron, O., the course being under the management of Mr. Herring, now of Community Service, and Bingham received the highest number of votes in a popularity contest to determine which of the eight numbers would appear for a return date on the next year's program. Funeral services were held Tuesday at one o'clock at the Swedish Lutheran church, with interment in Rosehill cemetery.

Mrs. Olesen leaves to survive her four children, O. Lawrence, Alfred E., Jennie M. Olsen, and Mrs. Emilie Elston.

CAPTURE MAN WHO BROKE JAIL HERE

FINED \$40 AND RELEASED

Sidney Mansfield, Safe-Blower and Ex-Convict, Given Hearing in Police Court Tuesday

Sidney Mansfield, one of the two men who escaped from the local jail last fall by digging their way out through the wall under a window, was fined \$40 and costs in Justice Smith's court Tuesday morning and released. Mansfield, who is in poor health, left immediately for Hot Springs.

The man has a prison record, having served two terms in federal prisons for safe blowing, according to the police. Authorities decided, however, that they did not have sufficient charges to carry the case before the grand jury. He was arrested in Chicago last week by a policeman who believed he was capturing "Tommy" O'Connor. He was identified as the man who broke jail here, and he was brought to Highland Park.

Mansfield told of the escape from jail; how the men had dug their way through the brick wall. He said that he and his companion parted immediately after their escape, and that he did not know where the other man was.

The two had been arrested by local officers who had discovered that they were carrying concealed weapons. Later they had been identified as safe-blowers with prison records. They had been incarcerated in the local jail until authorities could decide whether they were guilty of a robbery in Minnesota.

HIGHWOOD BARBER OVERCOME BY GAS

Friend Saves H. H. Beeghley from Death by Asphyxiation Wednesday Morning

H. H. Beeghley, Highwood barber, narrowly escaped death from asphyxiation yesterday morning. Neighbors rescued him just in time. Beeghley sleeps in the rear of his barber shop in North Waukegan avenue. A member of the family with whom he boards noticing that the shop was locked at 9:30 yesterday morning, procured a key and entered. He found the man overcome by gas, which had leaked from a gas heater. The office of the North Shore Gas company was notified and Manager Hoskins took a pulped and motor to the shop. With the aid of some oxygen gas the man was revived. He was then taken to the Highland Park hospital in the Prior ambulance, and is recovering rapidly from the effects of the gas.

POLLS OPEN FROM 1:00-7:00

Opportunity to Vote on New School Rooms, Gymnasium and Auditorium Next Saturday Afternoon

The voters living in District 107, Highland Park, are to have the opportunity next Saturday to vote for or against a proposition to build an additional school building on the Elm Place site and to authorize the issue of bonds to finance a building proposition. The Board of Education of that District has through the columns of the Press made public a careful analysis of the situation which necessitates action at this time and presented a fair statement of the question at issue. This was then re-copied and sent out in the form of a personal letter to more than one thousand voters.

It is evident that the Board has thoroughly studied the possibilities of providing adequate and modern facilities for all the pupils of the District. Its members are unanimous in recommending a favorable vote upon the proposition to locate the building upon the Elm Place site. The Editors and publishers of the Press are in favor of supporting the Board in its recommendations.

BANKING AND THRIFT LECTURES FOR SCHOOLS

\$40 in Prizes to be Awarded by Banks for Best Essay on Series of Lectures

As a part of a nation-wide campaign of education planned by the American Bankers Association, arrangements are under way for a series of nine lectures on Thrift and Banking, to be delivered before the seventh and eighth grades, and the high school, in this township.

The lectures will be given by a committee of local bankers, Mrs. E. J. Grundy, of the North Shore Trust Company, Mr. Harry Paul of the Highland Park Trust and Savings Bank, and Mr. J. M. Appel of the Highland Park State Bank, the first on Friday of this week, followed by two lectures each topic. The following are the topics:

Bank Deposits and Checks.
Bank Loans and Discounts.
Drafts and Letters of Credit.
What Bank Statements Mean.
Trusts and Trust Corporations.
Principles of Prosperity.
Work and Wealth.
Money and Other Commodities.
Federal Reserve System.

In order to stimulate the individual pupil's interest in the above lectures, the local banks have made up a fund for prizes to be awarded to eight pupils, — four from the grammar schools, and four from the high school for the best composition on the subject, "What I Learned from the Banking Lectures." Pupils will make notes during each lecture, and after the last lecture, deliver his or her findings and report to the committee for examination and decision.
