ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE FIELD DAY, FEB. 19

Lake County Churches Will Cooperate With Organization; Speakers Furnished

The Anti-Saloon League field day in Lake county will occur Sunday, Feb. 19. A speaker from the league will speak in every church which is cooperating with the league.

The following statement of the work of the organization is made by Geo. McGinnis, superintendent of the northern district of Illinois:

"Every reform passes through three stages—agitation, legislation and law enforcement. The Anti-Saloon League is in the last stage of this fight against liquor.

"Prohibition has been threshed out before the American people for twenty-five years and was put in the constitution in the legal orderly constitutional way provided by the law of the land, and it is now the duty of the minority to accept it and obey. Judge Landis states that over 90 per cent of the liquor violators are foreigners. Why should these aliens be allowed to walk with hob-nail shoes over our constitution? General Leonard Wood claims that "Prohibition is God's own blessing on America." Admiral Sims, the bluff old sea dog, told a London Times reporter that "Prohibition has closed the school of the drunkard." True! and when the graduates of this school die off, the law will not be violated.

"The work of the League now is to encourage and help the people to elect officials who will enforce the law. America has become the great demonstration plant of the world on prohibition and foreign investigators are coming here to see if prohibition can be made to "pro" and if it is a benefit to the nation. Hence it behooves us to uphold the constitution and thus blaze the way for a nobler manhood, a purer womanhood and a happier childhood in all the world.

"If moonshiners, blindpiggers and bootleggers afflict your community, there is a reason. All men and women who believe in law and order and good citizenship are cordially invited to be present in church on that day."

HEARING ON ZONING ORDINANCE NEXT WEEK

(Continued from Page 1)

It is difficult to realize what proportions the north shore towns will attain if the present rate of increase continues; and without restrictions such as are imposed by the zoning ordinance municipalities may become heterogeneous masses of residences, stores, industrial structures, flats, and apartments.

The adoption of a zoning ordinance tends to establish property values, and in general to increase and stabilize property values.

The purpose of the zoning ordinance is best described by quoting from Section 1 of the act: "In addition to existing powers, and to the end that adequate light, pure air and safety from fire and other dangers may be secured, that the taxable value of land and buildings throughout the city, village or incorporated town, may be conserved, that congestion in public streets may be lessened or avoided, and the public health, safety, comfort, morals and welfare may otherwise be promoted, the city council in each city, and the president and board of trustees in each village and incorporated town shall have the following powers."

It must be admitted that no ordinance which prescribes such radical changes can be enforced without interfering with the plans of certain individuals, but it is the duty of those entrusted with drafting such an ordinance to consider that "due allowance shall be made for existing conditions, the conservation of property values, the direction of building development to the best advantage to the entire city."
