### VISITING NURSE GIVES MONTHLY REPORT

Work Done During January in School Districts and City's Work Reported

December 1 to 31. During the month of December 205 calls were made of which six were inspection calls on families in quarantine, three were inspection calls on families who were reported as having broken their quarantine, ten were nursing calls on families who needed nurse service temporarily and the balance of the calls were on families who are under our general care and surveillance.

Under the special work during this month, we took one patient, a child, to the county hospital in Waukegan and accompanied one patient to the Highland Park hospital. We took one patient, an insanity case, to the Hahman hospital in Chicago. A party was given for the Mothers' Welfare society at the Y. W. C. A. Ice cream and cake were served, and the mothers and children seemed to enjoy the afternoon very much. A list of families in needy circumstances was given to the Elks. All on this list were taken care of by them. A very lovely donation of clothing consisting of underwear, nightclothes, stockings, sheets, towels, and pillow-slips was received from the Needle Guild. The Deerfield-Shields high school gave \$40 with which to purchase shoes and rubbers. Three families were provided. One child was given a dress, stockings, underwear and nightclothes. Mr. Tapper donated a coat and a serge dress for this child. Mrs. Griswold's session donated a dinner for a needy family of nine.
