**WHAT IS HONEY?**  
Honey is the nectar of flowers modified and evaporated by the bees. It is placed on the market in three forms: first, COMB HONEY as found in the small section boxes; second, EXTRACTED HONEY, so called because large combs are whirled in a machine called a honey-extractor, until the liquid honey has run out, leaving the combs practically empty as they can be put back in the hives to be filled again by the bees; third, GRANULATED HONEY, which is extracted honey that has been kept until it solidifies. Granulation in no wise affects the quality, for nearly every kind of honey, if kept long enough, will solidify or candy. It may be reduced again to the liquid form by being placed in a can that is surrounded by hot water. The extracted or liquid honey is often sold at a lower price for the reason that the wax of which the comb is built is produced by the bees at the expense of many times its own weight in honey, and since in this form the combs are not sold, but are filled over and over by the bees, this amount of wax is saved.

**RUSSELL IN FAVOR OF WIDER ROADS**  
Advocates 24-Ft. Highways at Large Centers; Most County Roads 18-Ft.

"Wider hard roads out of large centers" is the program favored by Charles E. Russell, county superintendent of highways, and he believes the main roads out of Waukegan, Libertyville, Highland Park, Lake Forest and various other towns in the county where traffic is heavy should have wider roads.  
"It is a question whether 20-ft. roads or the three-track, which is 27 feet wide, should be built," Supt. Russell declared. "It would not be good economy to build 20-ft. roads when 18-ft. would do. I believe that 80 per cent of all the roads in the state could be 18 feet wide."  
Supt. Russell advises that the Highland Park-Deerfield road should be 24 feet wide, this width having been agreed upon, the township to pay the difference in width, as the state can build them only 18 feet wide.  
Many of the Wisconsin roads are only 15 feet wide.  
Work of surveying Sheridan road, between North Chicago and Lake Forest, has been started, and Supt. Russell believes this stretch should be 27 feet wide, due to the enormous usage, and that the township and village should pay for the extra nine feet. He is hoping they will co-operate with the county in this respect. This road will handle the traffic that is now going over two roads in Lake Bluff, known as Sheridan road and McKinley or Waukegan road.  
Milwaukee road at Libertyville should also be wider, Supt. Russell believes.

**DEERING HOME AT FOX LAKE BURNED**  
Firemen Unable to Check Flames Early Last Saturday; \$100,000 Estimated Damage

Fire of unknown origin leveled the summer home of J. K. Deering, noted breeder of registered Jersey cattle, located on a part of the Deering estate on the north side of Fox lake, early last Saturday morning. Two fire departments, Fox Lake and Antioch, responded within 30 minutes after they had been notified of the blaze, but they were too late to check the flames that were whipped higher and higher from the gale that swept from the lake.  
About 10 o'clock Saturday morning a chauffeur noticed a flame break through a gable on the roof of the house. He notified the Fox Lake and Antioch fire departments immediately. They responded within 30 minutes from the roads being in bad condition from a recent thaw and freeze that followed, and the fire had eaten from the second floor of the mansion to the ground story before they arrived. Water pumped from the lake was thrown on the fire with but little effect.  
Conservative estimates of Lake Villa residents place the property loss at \$75,000.  
Arthur Simpson, manager of the Deering property in Lake county, was not at the summer home when the fire started. Firemen said that the blaze was discovered near an attic gable and it is thought that it might have started from sparks from a chimney.  
Mr. Deering, who is in Mexico, was sent word of the fire.  
The home is situated on a large tract of land a half mile from the barns in which the Deering blooded cattle are sheltered. The family has spent millions in perfecting stock, importing a number of animals from the Isle of Jersey.  
The destruction of the Deering home is the second large fire that has taken place in the lake region recently. It has been only a few weeks since the E. J. Lehmann estate suffered a fire that was said to have amounted to more than \$100,000.

**WANT GREEN BAY ROAD PAVED TO STATE LINE**

Seventy-five residents on and near Green Bay road from Spaulding's Corner to the Wisconsin state line have signed a petition asking that Green Bay road be paved from Wadsworth road to the state line, a distance of four and one-half miles.  
The petitioners expect to take the matter before the county board of supervisors at the next meeting and it is also planned to bring it to the attention of the Waukegan Chamber of Commerce for endorsement.  
The county has the money available for paving this road from Grand avenue to Wadsworth road and this work will be done probably next year, and if the improvement that the petitioners want is also made it will mean a continuous pavement through to the state line, where it will connect with hard road constructed by Wisconsin.
