

**PUBLIC SERVICE CO.  
PLANS EXTENTIONS**

**PROGRAM IS ANNOUNCED**

**Thousands of Dollars Worth of  
Construction Work is Out-  
lined For This  
Year**

Belief that the bottom of the industrial depression has been reached and confidence in the future of Evanston and adjoining north shore territory is seen in the annual statement made public by Superintendent J. E. Reesman, of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois, showing construction plans for the year totaling thousands of dollars. The company's intention to proceed with construction work was made public in connection with the sending of the annual report to stockholders.

Building plans contemplated by the electric and gas company for the year in Evanston and vicinity include:

Electric extensions estimated to cost \$45,000.

A third transmission line constructed for 33,000 volts between Evanston, Highland Park and Lake Bluff, making for increased capacity and greater service along the north shore on an estimate to cost \$37,000.

High pressure two inch gas main extensions and low pressure six inch gas main extensions estimated to cost \$13,000.

The building of 5,000 kilowatts of additional transformer capacity at the out-door sub-station, Dodge avenue and Church street, indicating the Company's belief in the substantial future growth of that section.

Construction of a 20,000 volt line from Evanston to Des Plaines and building of a 2500 kilowatt out-door transformer installation at the latter place to meet demands for electrical power for industrial purposes and the increased number of domestic customers.

Installation of 3,000 kilowatts of additional transformer capacity at Highland Park so as to give greater service here, estimated to cost \$30,000.

Raising of the voltage of the transmission lines north and west of the city is the first step in the actual construction of the giant electric plant to be built by the Public Service Company, on the shores of Lake Michigan just north of Waukegan, for which ground has already been purchased. Work of designing the plant is under way and it is possible that the first unit equipped with a turbine having a capacity of 20,000 kilowatts may be possible of installation before the end of the year. This first unit, alone, will cost over \$2,000,000. When completed the plant is expected to have a maximum capacity of 200,000 kilowatts, or ten times the size of the first unit, and will rank among the largest generating stations in the country.

The additional electric power facilities provided by the new plant is expected to at once greatly expand the industrial business of the north shore manufacturing districts and provide a more bountiful supply of energy to the residential sections than in any similar district in the country.

That Evanston didn't stand still during 1921 is shown by the annual statement which indicates that 686 customers were added to the electric system, an increase of 8 per cent. Counting five to a family, this would mean service to approximately 3500 more people.

The substantial growth of this city and adjacent territory served by the Public Service Company during the last year, in spite of business depression, and the vastness of the machinery necessary to serve the people, is strikingly shown by the figures in the annual statement. Total number of electric light and power customers on Jan. 1, 1922, was 118,304, an increase of 11,999 for the year. Total number of households and industries served with gas was 74,056, an increase of 2,892.

To meet the electrical requirements of the territory it was necessary for the big plants to generate 359,410,684 kilowatt hours of energy, necessitating use of 400,000 tons of coal. The enormous total of 2,734,393,000 cubic feet of gas was produced, over 100,000 tons of coal and coke and more than 8,000,000 gallons of gas oil being necessary in the manufacturing process. To protect the electric and gas supply for the people of the territory, the company has purchased its own coal mines and last year 98 per cent of this fuel came from its own mines.

Linking up the remainder of the territory with this city are now 700 miles of high voltage electric transmission lines and 900 miles of gas mains. To these are linked thousands of miles of smaller electric lines and gas pipes. In the territory a population exceeding 500,000 now receives service.

The company is now owned by more than 10,200 stockholders, practically all of whom are customers and live in the territory served. In addition on Jan. 1, there were 2,548 subscribers paying month by month for their securities. Of the stockholders 1,230 are employees who either have fully paid for their stock or are buying it on a partial plan. This is believed to be the largest ownership by employees, in proportion to number of any public utility company in the

world. Faith of the company in the future of the district is seen in the fact that its investment now is upwards of \$60,000,000.

"The Company has the greatest confidence in the future of this city and the territory served and believes that there should be no halt, in spite of business depression, in building," the annual statement says. "While business in all lines decreased greatly it is the confident belief that no district in the country will make such a rapid recovery as that of Northern Illinois. The widely diversified industry, the rich farms, the mines and of general business will bring this about and this will be hastened by cooperative effort between communities and the industries serving them."

| 3/4 cup shortening | 1 cup milk        | 4 teaspoons Dr. Price's Baking Powder  |
| 1 cup sugar        | 1 1/4 cups flour  | 1 teaspoon vanilla extract             |
