Knotted Cords Make Noisy Lines

The cloth-covered cord which connects your telephone instrument with the bell box and the cord running to the telephone receiver are each made up of a number of fine wires covered with light insulation. If these cords were not made in this way they would not be flexible. They are necessarily delicate and easily put out of order by misuse.

Subscribers are requested to avoid twisting and knotting the telephone cords as this wears through the insulation, breaks the fine wires and causes short circuits. The first effect is usually a scratching noise in the receiver and later the telephone is put out of service entirely.

The fifth rehearsal of the Community Minstrel under the joint auspices of Community Service and the Young Men's club was held at Elm Place school last Tuesday evening. The attendance was good and the best rehearsal so far was had. Drills and dance steps in the first part were started and the initial work passages a most pleasing entertainment. The committee in charge has lined up some of the best talent in Highland Park—in fact the committee is holding back the names of some of the principals from public announcement as they wish to "spring" this information on the public nearer the production date of the show. Director Herring announces that he needs three or four good male soloists, and a few more girls for the show. Next rehearsal will be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. and this rehearsal will be followed by one on Monday evening next, at 7:30 p. m.

SUMMARY

In addition the Community Center has carried on the work of the Employment Bureau, and has had considerable success in placing a number of men, women and boys in employment.

The Community Service Conference held on the 22nd and 23rd was of a vast amount of benefit to us, not only in the interchange of ideas and methods, but to the local work through the contacts established between our citizens and representatives of the service.

Committees were unusually active during the month. The House Committee had the Center in splendid condition for the Conference. The Music Committee had a good program for the Lyceum Course, and the hospitality committee did a fine piece of work in arranging for home hospitality, and suite.

Kind words of appreciation for the work you are doing comes to our ears quite often, and is occasionally accompanied with checks. There is a dire need for facilities for indoor activities—such as gymnasium and auditorium.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT NOTICE No. 257

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered the improvement of the roadway of First Street, from the southerly line of Laurel Avenue, East of First Street extended west, to the southerly line extended of the present southerly curb in Central Avenue, and said First Street from the northerly line extended of the present northerly curb in Central Avenue, to, and connecting with the hereinafter proposed improvement in Elm Place, also of Elm Place, from the easterly line extended of Second Street to a line forty seven (47) feet westerly from and parallel with the easterly line extended of St. Johns Avenue, except where said Elm Place crosses the rights of way of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company, and Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee Railroad Company; also including the improvement of the east and west street returns at Laurel Avenue, and the north street return at said Elm Place and First Street as far back as the street lines extended be improved by grading, draining, constructing manhole covers, present pavements and curbing, where said improvement herein provided for meets present paving and curbing, furnishing and setting new manhole cover; moving and resetting fire hydrants and drinking fountain; removing old curbing; filling abandoned catch basins; preparing the sub-grade for the proposed paving; paving with reinforced Portland Cement Concrete the roadways of said streets, the ordinance for same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of said city and having applied to the County Court of Lake County for an assessment of the costs of said improvement according to benefits, and an assessment thereof having been made and returned to said court, the final hearing thereon will be had on the 18th day of March A. D. 1922, or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit.

Said assessment is payable in Ten (10) installments, with interest at the rate of five (5) per centum per annum on all installments from and after date of issue of first voucher. All persons desiring may file objections in said court before said day and may appear on the hearing and make their defense.
