NORRIS PARRATT DIES IN WISCONSIN

FUNERAL HELD SATURDAY

Former Building Inspector of Highland Park Succumbs After Illness; Well Known Here

The funeral of Norris Parratt, former building inspector of Highland Park, who died at Iron Mountain, Wis., Thursday, March 23, was held from the home of his parents on North St. Johns avenue, Saturday afternoon. Death was due to an attack of pneumonia.

His passing seemed peculiarly untimely. Still in early manhood he was just assuming positions of large responsibility for which his training and varied experience had richly prepared him. He was happily married to an attractive and talented young woman and he was the central figure about whom plans of parents and associates for a successful future seemed to be maturing. He had like ways and was very popular among his associates, including his business subordinates. His enthusiasm for the out-of-doors and his keen interest in the big things of life promised a rich maturity of character for future years.

CHANGE MADE IN VOTING PRECINCTS

BOUNDARY LINES MOVED

Residents in Precincts 6, 7, and 8 Asked to Take Note of Recent Alterations in Polling Places

Voters in Highland Park are asked to take note of rearrangements that have been made in precincts Nos. 6, 7 and 8.

The district north of Central avenue, west of Green Bay road, and south of Elm Place has been transferred to Precinct No. 7, and residents in this territory will vote at the fire station, corner of Central avenue and Green Bay road, instead of at Henry Edwards' store as formerly.

The boundary line between Precincts 7 and 8 has been changed. It now runs from the corporate limits along Deerfield avenue, then east along Walnut avenue to the Chicago and North Western railroad tracks. This change was made in order to include the Hines Lumber Co. office within the 8th precinct. The voting place has been transferred from the Lincoln school to the Hines Lumber Co. office, a more convenient location for the majority of voters in the precinct. Precincts 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 will remain the same.

These changes are exceptionally fortunate for the city, and were brought about through the efforts of Supervisor W. J. Obee, candidate for county treasurer in the primary election April 1.

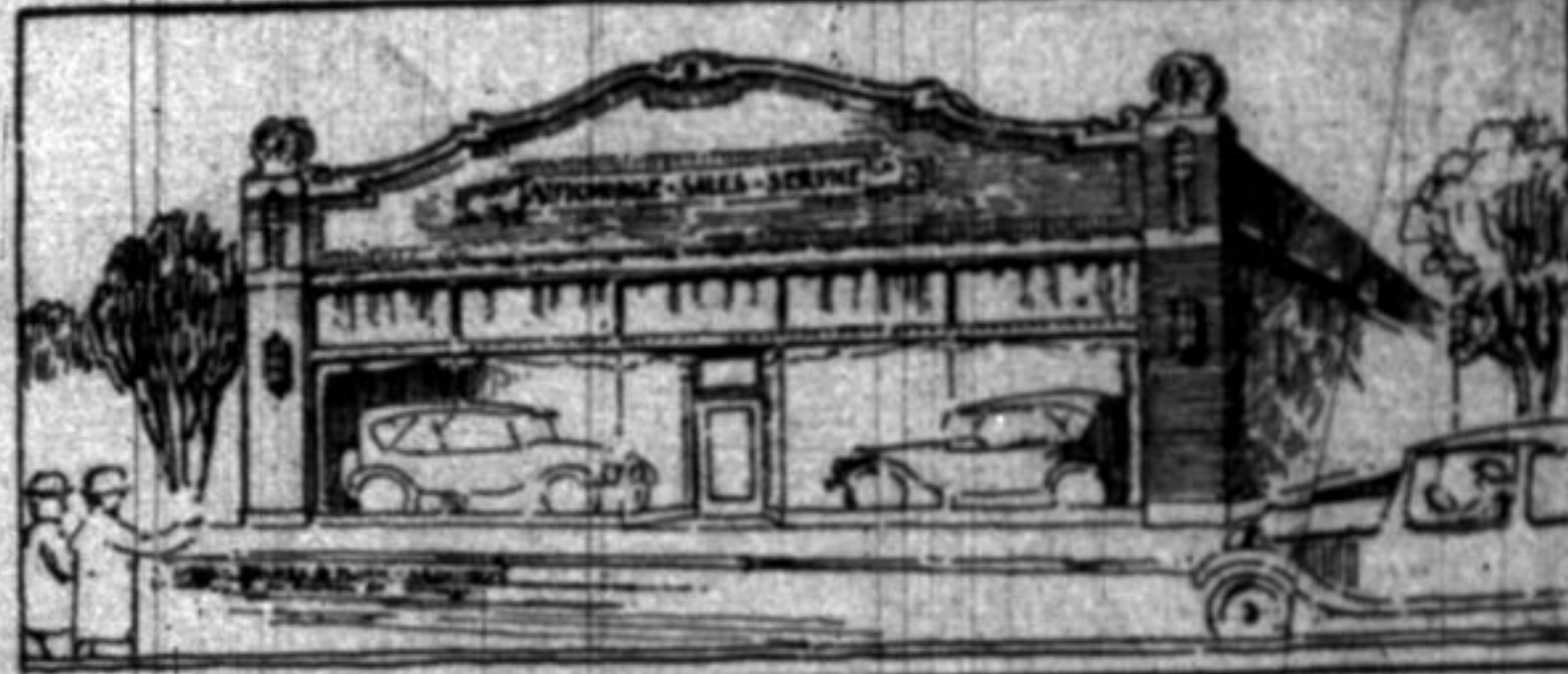
MINSTREL SHOW IS WELL UNDER WAY

Fragments only, consisting of the characteristic theme of the piece were played.

While the papers were being graded the A Capella choir of Northwestern university, Dean Peter C. Lutkin, director, gave a very interesting program. ZONING ORDINANCE PASSED BY COUNCIL

The city zoning ordinance as amended was passed at the meeting of the city council last Friday evening, and becomes a law today. The ordinance is published in full in another page of this issue. The council also passed a resolution to advertise for bids for laying water mains and sewers in Ravinia Highlands, the county court having confirmed the special assessment. An ordinance was passed fixing the fiscal year for the city. The fiscal year will begin May 1. The council approved the subdivision of Lot 115, South Highland addition to Highland Park, subject to the corporation council's O. K.

FRANK D. GALLAGHER DIED LAST EVENING

HE WAS 52 YEARS OF AGE

Funeral Services at Immaculate Conception Church Sunday Morning at 8:00. Burial at Cavalry

Mr. Frank D. Gallagher, who for the past twenty-five years has been proprietor of the Highland Park Ice Co., passed away last evening at twenty minutes after eight, at his residence, 237 N. St. Johns Ave., as the result of stomach trouble from which he has suffered for the past few months. He underwent an operation the latter part of December and never fully recovered from the effects of it.

Mr. Gallagher was born in Highland Park fifty-two years ago and has made it his residence ever since. Besides his wife he leaves to survive his two sons, John and Fred; three sisters, Cora and Nell Gallagher and Kathryn Dugan and three brothers, John of Highland Park, and Charles, and William Gallagher of Los Angeles, Calif.

Funeral services will be held Sunday morning at eight o'clock at the Immaculate Conception church, the Rev. Dr. O'Neill officiating. Burial will be made in Cavalry cemetery.

Mr. Gallagher was a member of the Royal Arcanum and Highland Park Lodge, 1362, B. P. O. E.

His long residence in this vicinity has made for him a host of friends who will be very sad indeed, to learn of his untimely death.
